South Omaha, July 11.—The market this week is only holding steady on best, dry lot beeves. Common kinds of corn fed and grass cattle are dull and lower. We look to see prime cattle sell higher and the common ones lower. Range cattle are expected to move early this year.

Omaha, July 11.—The receipts at the Omaha grain exchange today were: One car wheat; 12 cars corn; 5 cars oats. The shipments were 13 cars wheat; 46 cars corn; 4 cars oats; 1 car rye. Total shipments, 18 cars; total shipments 64 cars.

Wheat grain lost all the gain it made yesterday and today's prices are for wheat, about a cent lower than those of Monday and about the same as Saturday's prices. Corn and oats, however, managed to retain the increase they secured yesterday.

Business was not as heavy today in the option pit as it has been for the past week. Prices were somewhat weaker and fluctuated very slightly, and the brokers took things easy, rather than start an active market.

### Chicago Grain

Chicago, July 11.—Active selling here caused by the excellent condition of the American crop as indicated by the government crop report caused a weak close in the local wheat market, the final quotations on the September delivery being off three eighths of a cent.

The government report indicates a total crop of 710,000,000 bushels which with the exception of the yield of 1901 is the largest wheat crop in the history of the country.

New York, June 11.—Special cables and telegraphic communications received by Bradstreets show the following changes in available supplies as compared with last account:

Wheat—U. S. and Canada, east of the Rockies, decreased 1,279,000 bushels; afloat for and in Europe, decreased 1,400,000. Total supply decreased 5,570,000.

Corn, U. S. and Canada east of the Rockies, decreased 13,000.

Oats—U. S. and Canada, east of the Rockies, decreased 206,000.

The leading decreases reported this week are: Manitoba 249,000 bushels, Louisville 70,000; Portland, Me., 55,000, Kingston, Ont., 55,000.

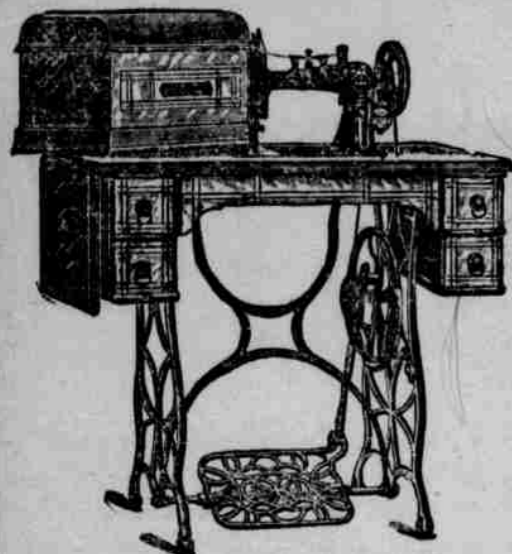
