'SMASH RACE BARRIERS' WHITE WOMAN TELLS THE GEORGIA COURTS

ATLANTA, Ga.—Taking the witness stand in her own defense in a courtroom crowded with white and Negro workers, a native white Southern woman last week proclaimed that "the working class in the South must smash the barriers between the races." The sincerity of her belief in this doctrine was symbolized by the presence in court of a Negro attorney, who acted as her defense counsel. It was a choice for which the defendant had had to endure beatings and abuse in jail before coming to trial.

EVVE BO'S BREAKS ARM OF WORKER IN PAY DISPUTE

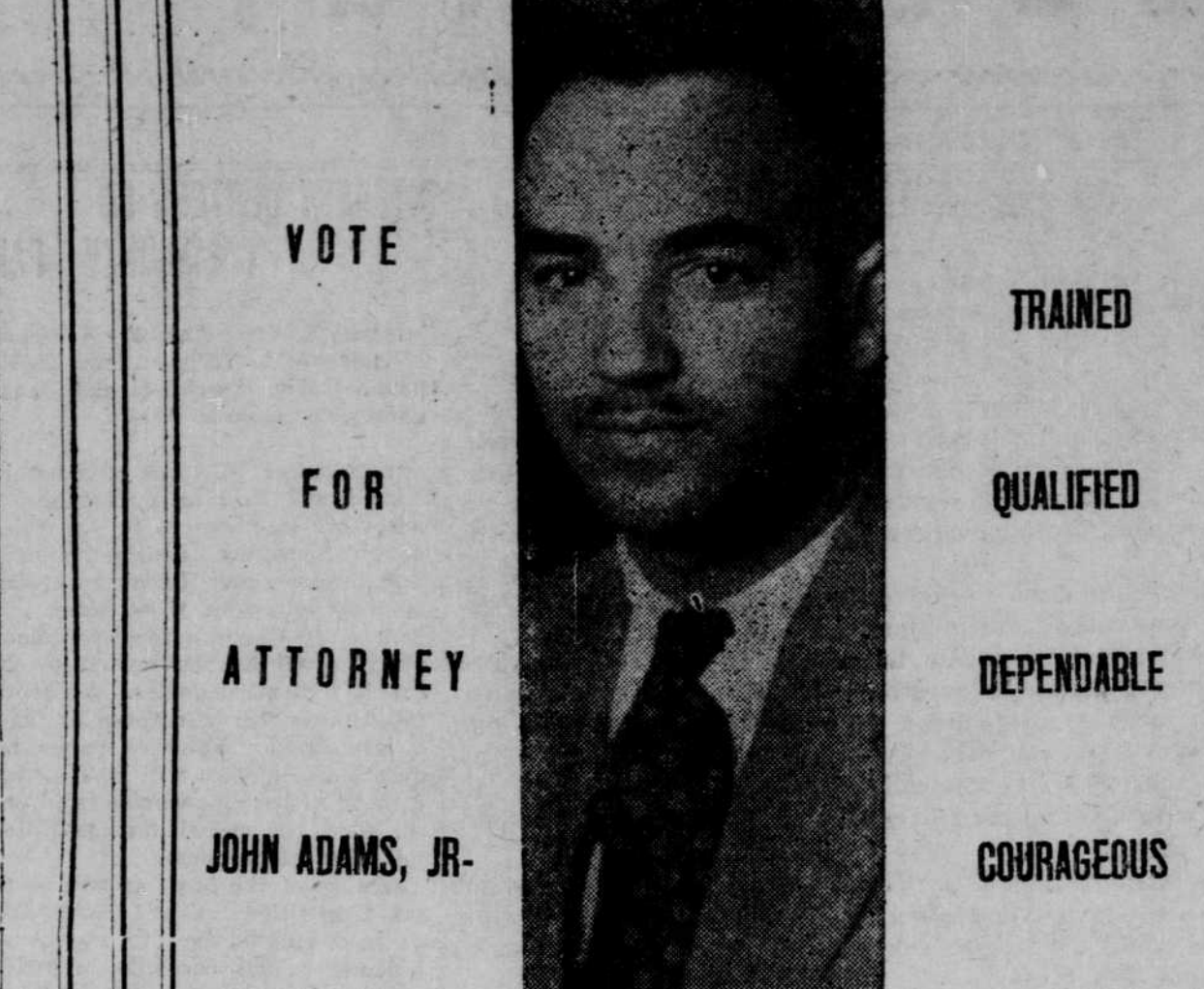

EARTHQUAKE TREMOR ENLIVEN'S A F OF L CONVENTION SESSION

SAN FRANCISCO—(FP)—The Polk Hall wing of the Civic Auditorium scene of the 54th annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, rocked with something besides oratory during the course of the half-day session Oct. 2. At 12:25 p. m. when Spencer Miller, Jr., secretary of the Workers' Educational Bureau, was in the middle of a talk outlining the educational work of labor institutes, one of the severest earthquakes shocks in the Bay Region for the past few years, shook the convention hall.

DOG'S SENATOR HATFIELD

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Although four years have elapsed since U. S. Senator Hatfield of West Virginia voted for the confirmation of Judge Parker to the U. S. Supreme Court over the objections of his Negro constituents, his action still dogs his political footsteps. The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has just received a letter from Rivers, secretary of Local Union No. 004, United Mine Workers of America, Glen Rogers, W. Va., asking for information on Senator Hatfield's vote in the Parker fight. The letter states that Hatfield "is at present trying to be re-elected and is passing as a great friend of labor, also of the Negro race and we want to know what is true feeling toward the Negro is. We would appreciate any information you would give us regarding this man and his position on any question affecting the Negro race or Labor in general."

A. F. OF L. ASKED TO OKEY ANTI-LYNCHING BILL

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Endorsement of a federal anti-lynching law by the convention of the American Federation of Labor was asked in a telegram to the convention in San Francisco today by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Walter White, N. A. A. C. P. secretary, urged endorsement "to check mob murder which is a form of intimidation designed to continue the separation of white and black labor and the exploitation of both."
