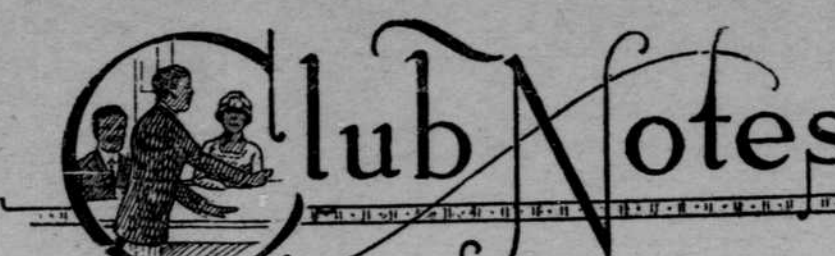
Mrs. Mason's mother, Mrs. Webster, has been ill at the home of her daughter for the past week.
