Harvey Kerns, the executive secretary of the Omaha Urban League who has been active in the association for the past two years, was elected executive chairman of the executive committee for the coming year. The Interstate Literary Association of Kansas and the West voted to accept Omaha as the place of meeting for their forty-fourth annual meeting in 1935, meeting on invitation extended by the Omaha delegation headed by Mr. J. Harvey Kerns.
