

PRESENT ADMINISTRATION "DOING A MOST SATISFAC-TORY JOB," SAYS REPORT.

Topeka, Kansas, March 14 .--By the Continental Press .- The Kansas Legislature which ended early Sunday morning appropriated eighty-three thousand dollars for the upkeep of the State Industrial Department at Western University for the fiscal years

The appropriation by this session of the Kansas Legislature reluired no lobbying and was given without protest on the part of the Legislature. The attitude of the Legislature in this instance was in diametrical and sharp contrast to previous appropriations, there having been necessity for much lobbying and strong influence on the part of those interested in Western University.

The recent appropriation without necessity of lobbying and insistence is viewed as an unmistakable indication of the State's satisfaction and approval of the management of the affairs of the historie Quindaro institution under the present administration of the State Board of Trustees named by Governor Alf. M. Landon and Bishop W. T. Vernon, present superintendent who was elected by the State Board of Trustees. The board of trustees named by Governor Landon is composed of: Bishop J.
