

# IN THE REALM OF ...SPORTS...

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 26.—Smothered under a relentless air attack, a hard fighting Fisk "Bulldog" team went down to defeat by LeMoyné, by a score of 25-0. Led by fullback Turpin, playing with a broken nose, whose passes to Spearman, Roulhac, Bonner, and Becton, were often completed for large gains, the "Yellow Jackets" scored two touchdowns each in the second and fourth quarters. Fisk was able to give a demonstration of her running attack only in the first quarter when the work of Murphy, Tinch and R. Ross kept the ball mainly in LeMoyné territory. Failing to do much with the Fisk line, LeMoyné opened up her air attack, and a pass from Turpin to Spearman was good for 40 yards and a touchdown. Later in the same quarter two passes, Turpin to Spearman, for 20 yards, and Turpin to Roulhac, for 19 yards, made the score 12-0. The third quarter was mainly a kicking duel between Thomas of Fisk and Turpin of LeMoyné, with the edge in yardage going to Thomas. In the fourth quarter, a series of LeMoyné passes took the ball to the Fisk 9-yard line from which Turpin, in two plays, made the score 18-0. In the closing minutes of the quarter a lateral pass from Turpin to Brooks, who then threw a forward pass to Roulhac, was good for 40 yards and the final touchdown of the game. Brooks' kick was good for the only extra point of the game and made the score 25-0. On the ground the teams were evenly matched but in the air the Yellow Jackets were always above the Bulldogs.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 26.—(ANP)—Fritz Pollard, former All American football star of Brown university was named by George Trevor, white local sports writer as a member of the "all time, all star football team of Brown university" here last week.

Discussing Pollard's ability Trevor said: "The Negro race has never produced a half back to match Fritz Pollard, the dusky shadow who slipped like a phantom through the Yale and Harvard teams in 1916. So steeply did he bank when pivoting that he seemed to be running in one ear and his tremendous speed burst left tacklers biting the turf. Pollard could take it too, as he proved in the losing battle against Colgate on a muddy field when his spirited tackling prevented an even worse rout."

## Offer Joe Louis Jersey Bout

New York, Oct. 26.—(By A. E. White for ANP)—Nick Kline, president of the Newark Sportsmen Club of Newark is out with an offer to Joe Louis for a match with Tony Galento, the coming fighter in Jersey.

## England's Churches Condemn Italy

London, Eng., Oct. 26, (ANP)—Unlike Pope Pius, who is reported to be the author of a peace plan which will persuade Italy to stop her offensive against Ethiopia at the price of occupying certain choice portions of the African country, England's leading churchman, the Archbishop of Canterbury, came out this week in a severe castigation of Italian methods.

Said the Archbishop, speaking at West Wickham, in Kent, Saturday: "Our hearts are sickened at the thought of the beginning of this slaughter of the people of Abyssinia—a nation backward, perhaps, according to modern civilization, but highly proud of its ancient life—and when we think of them being mowed down by a great and carefully prepared machine of slaughter."

"It is our hope that the League will not suffer a defiance of the pledges and covenants, which Italy signed, to pass unnoticed without some effort to restrain her and vindicate the common law of reason and justice, which Italy pledged herself to acknowledge and obey."

The Archbishop said that there was plainly need for something to be done, but the force must be spiritual and not material, which, pray God, we may not be obliged to use, because material force never established peace."

## Appoint White Man To Virgin Island Judgeship

Chicago, Oct. 26, (ANP)—Keen disappointment was expressed by officers of the National Bar Association here Wednesday when they received information that a white lawyer, Albert Levitt, had received the appointment to the judgeship of the United States District Court of the Virgin Islands. It had been confidently expected that the post would go to a colored man.

In February, 1934, when word was quietly passed around that a colored lawyer would be considered for the post, it was at the request of Attorney General Cummings that a special committee of the National Bar Association submitted a memorandum on its choice for the judgeship and nominated C. Francis Stradford, of the Chicago Bar. Following that recommendation, Mr. Stradford received the endorsement of some of the most outstanding individuals and organizations in this country, among them being Justice Stone of the United States Supreme Court, Judge William H. Holly, of the United States District Court, A. Philip Randolph, President of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor, John Haynes Holmes, nationally known minister, and the Honorable James Hamilton Lewis, senior senator of Illinois. The press was unanimous in its support of the bar association program and felt that the time had come for the appointment of an understanding, well trained and experienced colored lawyer to the United States District Court bench. More-over Secretary Ickes and the recently appointed Governor Cramer were reported favorable to a colored man holding the job.

"That a white lawyer, not widely known and not as well fit by training, character, experience and ability as Mr. Stradford, should be appointed to preside over the District Court of the Virgin Islands, whose population is almost 98% colored, is indeed unfortunate," said President George W. Lawrence here Friday. "It would seem that this is not a New Deal but a very old one which refuses to accord the proper recognition to Negroes."

## Stepin Fetchit Takes Boston; Untroubled By Fox Fiareup

Boston, Mass., Oct. 26.—(ANP)—not the least bit worried by his recent flareup and disagreement which cost him his job at the Fox film studios in Hollywood, Stepin Fetchit put in his personal appearance here for the first time last week at the Boston theatre, sharing top billing with Noble Sissle and his orchestra.

Local critics were loud in their praise of the antics of "the world's laziest man." He continued a personal characterization of the type of role which brought him success on the screen, even throwing in a few dance steps toward the end that tired him so much he had his usher take bows for him.

In addition to Stepin and Sissle who put on an entertaining show, the entire ensemble included the Five Cabin Kids, Harris and Howell, and Henry "Rubberlegs" Williams.

## Say Whites Had Better Study Racial Values

Washington, Oct. 26, (ANP)—Talking at the Pan American Institute of Geography and History, held at the Pan American Union here Wednesday, Dr. A. V. Kidder of the Carnegie Foundation declared, that whites were neglecting racial and cultural contacts and were too busy trying to veneer western civilization over the rest of the globe to realize what was really at the bottom of what is now going on in Africa, China, India and Russia.

"And in Latin America the most critical situations—social, governmental, racial—have been brought about by the penetrations of small Caucasian groups into regions thickly populated by Indians," he said. "This scatter of race is one which will become of increasing urgency as time goes on and the world becomes more densely crowded. Of more immediate concern, however, is the whole vast question of social and economic relationships under a rapidly mechanizing civilization."

"Civilization progresses unevenly, its material components, always tending to outstrip its spiritual attributes. And when it gets in one way or another out of hand, come war, pestilence, economic maladjustments or any one of the hundred secondary ills which bring social orders to collapse. So it was with Egypt and Greece and Rome. So it must have been with the Maya. So it may well be with us. If we are to cope with this Frankenstein monster, if we are to keep it in its place as a servant of man, we must understand it far better than we do today."

## Selassie's Nephew, In Front Lines

Chicago, Oct. 26.—(ANP)—Dr. Malaku E. Bayon, Howard Medical School graduate of the class of 1936, and nephew of Emperor Haile Selassie is serving on the front with the Ethiopian army according to information received here from Colonel John C. Robinson this week. Dr. Bayon has charge of a group of young Ethiopian medical men and is active in organizing the forces of the Ethiopian Red Cross, Colonel Robinson was anxious that relatives of Mrs. Bayon who live in Evanston, Ill., be not alarmed, however, and said that Dr. Bayon was able to come to Addis Ababa frequently in order to visit his wife and young son who were both well and happy. The junior Bayon appeared to be enjoying life in Ethiopia, he said, with the exception that he could not understand why he was unable to understand when the little Ethiopian boys spoke to him.

Dr. Bayon married Miss Dorothy Hadley, a former resident of Evanston and Chicago. Mrs. Bayon formerly was in the employ of the Victory Life Insurance company. When Mr. Johnston became treasurer of Howard university she went to Washington with him, later serving as a secretary in the office of Dr. Numa P. G. Adams, dean of Howard Medical School. It was while she was working at Howard Medical School that she met and was wed to Dr. Bayon. Rumors abounded in Washington for a time that Dr. Bayon was a son of Emperor Haile Selassie, but the doctor who is a modest, clean cut young chap informed the Associated Negro Press some months ago that he was a blood nephew of the Ethiopian ruler.
