Atlanta University Uses Motion Pictures

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 23, (Special)—Talking motion pictures will in time become as much an adjunct of the teaching process in schools and colleges as books, laboratory experiments and classroom and gymnasium exercises are today, Donald P. Bean, of the University of Chicago Press, told members of the faculties and student bodies of Atlanta University, Morehouse College and Spelman College today. To prove the efficiency of talking pictures as a teaching medium, he showed to the assembly in Sala Hall Chapel eight reels of films which have been produced for classroom use and which dealt with subjects in the fields of music, physics, biology, geology, and educational psychology. In the course of the two-hour demonstration which was witnessed by more than 60 interested students and teachers, talking motion pictures were shown which in turn illustrated the functions of the various instruments in a symphonic choir, the action of sound waves, the life span of a butterfly, the multiplicity of animal life on the seashore, the effect of ice on the topography of the North American continent, the evolution of volcanoes, and finally the fundamentals of child psychology. The films shown were produced through the efforts of the University of Chicago working with the American Museum of Natural History, the National Park Service, the Bell Telephone Laboratories and other organizations. Locally the showing at Atlanta University was made possible by the co-operation of visual education department of the Atlanta public schools, the Strickland Industrial Film Corporation, which furnished the projection machine and staff for the demonstration, and the University of Chicago.

A wind recording instrument that can be quickly raised and lowered along a radio tower has been installed in an Ohio city for studying air currents to aid in mooring airships.

Reverses Decision On Herndon Writ

Fight For Herndon's Freedom To Be Taken to Supreme Court If Necessary

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 23—The fierce determination of Georgia authorities to send Angelo Herndon to the chain-gang to serve his eighteen to twenty years sentence under an ancient slave law, was further exposed during the hearing on a writ of habeas corpus in Fulton County Superior Court yesterday.

Walter LeCraw, Assistant Solicitor General of the state, represented Georgia before Judge Hugh L. Dorsey. In a two hour argument filled with every possible appeal to passion and intolerance, Mr. LeCraw reiterated his arguments, made before the U. S. Supreme Court last spring where he represented Georgia, charging that Herndon "sought to foster the aims of the Red Committee at Moscow advocating the confiscation of the property of the white landlords for the use of the Negro farmers," and also "advocating the overthrow of republican government to set up a Negro government in the so-called Black Belt of the South."

Georgia Moves to Eliminate Evidence

The writ of habeas corpus was sought on the grounds that the constitutionality of the law under which Herndon was charged and sentenced had never been tested either in state or federal courts. Mr. LeCraw moved that all reference to the evidence in the Herndon case—the basis of the contention of the defense to prove that the due process of law clause of the Fourteenth amendment to the federal constitution had been violated in the Herndon case—be eliminated from the petition for the writ. Decision on this motion was also reserved by Judge Dorsey.

Angelo Herndon was present at this hearing. He was brought into court from Fulton Tower prison where he has been incarcerated since October 29 when he surrendered to Georgia authorities. A restraining court order prevented the authorities from sending him directly to the chain gang until the hearing. This stay extends over until the final decision is handed down by Judge Dorsey. Herndon showed evidence of ill-effects of his confinement on his health. He coughed frequently throughout the proceedings.

Represented by Outstanding Attorneys

Angelo Herndon was represented by Whitney Seymour of New York, brilliant constitutional authority retained by the International Labor Defense, and W. A. Sutherland of Atlanta. Seymour argued Herndon's case before the U. S. Supreme Court last spring. His argument in Superior Court yesterday, was marked by the same searching analysis of the unconstitutionality of the "insurrection law" and its application to Angelo Herndon. Mr. Sutherland, who was retained by Mr. Seymour for the writ actions argued the general defense questions and announced that the appeal on the writ would be taken all the way to the U. S. Supreme Court if necessary.

Though Herndon was arrested in the summer of 1932 on charges growing out of a demonstration of Negro and white unemployed which demanded relief from Atlanta officials, the prosecution, Judge Dorsey, the head of the Georgia American Legion Honorary Society,
