Circulation Dwindling. "Circulation continues to dwindle, advertising remains slashed in half, and reports indicate, the publisher is experiencing exereme Ted Poston, locked out city editor of the paper and chairman of the "Amsterdam News" unit.

Mrs. Sadie Warren Davis, owner and publisher of the "Amsterdam News," fired the entire editorial staff on October 9th, after they had asked for a collective bargaining agreement, with the Guild. The staff aske an agreement covering working conditions, hours, vacations, dismissal notices and other matters to improve their working conditions.
