Arthur C. Thomsen, District Judge

In the eight years Judge Arthur C. Thomsen has served this district as judge, he has made a record that has established him through-out judicial circles of Nebraska as one of the state's outstanding jurists.

Soon after entering his duties as district judge, Judge Thomsen established a procedure in his court which saved time and money litigants and won the commendation of the Supreme Court. In one of its opinions the court said, "This is in line with the modern prevailing tendency toward practicalism which seeks to shorten and to simplify judicial procedure."

As a result of his efficiency in the conduct of his court, Judge Thomsen had few reversals during the time he has occupied the district bench.

Judge Thomsen is a native Nebraskan and has been a resident of Omaha for 47 years. He served as a lieutenant in the balloon division of the aviation section during the world war, is dean of the law school of the University of Omaha and prior to his elevation to the bench enjoyed a splendid legal practice.

In seeking re-election Judge Thomsen is sincere in the belief that, with the wide experience he has had as district judge, and the intense interest he has taken in his work, he is in a position in which he can render valuable and conscientious service to his state and community.

Judge Frank Dineen Leads First Voters Up For Reelection

Although one of the younger district judges, Judge Frank M. Dineen candidate for re-election as Judge of the District court, is old in judicial experience. For fourteen years Judge Dineen has occupied the bench in this district.

Following his graduation from Creighton university law school, Judge Dineen had several years varied legal experience which provided a substantial foundation for his career as judge. He was one of the judges who, when the City of Omaha re-organized its municipal court system helped establish and to attain the present high standard of efficiency the municipal court enjoys today.

Judge Dineen has had the equity factor in the District court for the past eight years. This fact has handled all those cases in which the litigants have no recourse in law which are tried to the court without a jury. It requires a judge of that temperament and legal experience that Judge Dineen possesses.

Many important cases involving huge sums of money have been tried by Judge Dineen to the satisfaction of all concerned. There is nothing of the spectacular or sensational in Judge Dineen's court. This division of the court carries on quietly, without blaring headlines transacting much of the really important business of the district court.

During his eight years tenure, Judge Dineen has presided at the naturalization of 2,000 new citizens of the United States. They have stood before Judge Dineen and have sworn allegiance to the Stars and stripes and to their adopted country.

Judge Dineen, aside from his judicial duties has always taken an interest and active part in the civic life of Omaha.
