Mr. Sam Breakfield was released from the University Hospital Friday, Oct. 16. He says he feels "fine."

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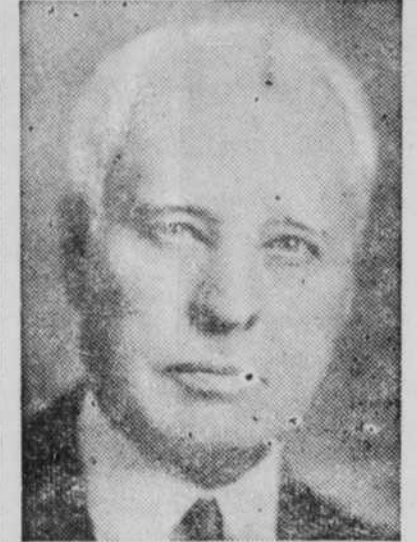
Callaway on the Air

Priests Urge A Square Deal for Negro Catholics

New York City, Oct. 18 (ANP)—Colored Catholics throughout the country hailed with joy the appearance of the three-day session of the National Catechetical Congress, that the Roman Catholic hierarchy in the United States take a unanimous and consistent stand on the Negro question. The stirring appeal was addressed to the body by the northern and southern priests engaged in the work of evangelization among Negroes.

The convention with a dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria, attended by the most distinguished members of the hierarchy and by many prominent laymen. The Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, was the guest of honor and the principal speaker at the banquet.

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Communist organizations rapidly as a result of their lost faith and confidence in the sincerity of the large Christian churches. The prelate urged an official Catholic proclamation on the attitude toward the Negro.

250,000 Colored Catholics in U. S. The Very Rev. Francis A. Walsh, director of the National Center of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, reported that postcard inquiries sent to religious orders all over America brought the information that 375 Catholic priests were working either full time or part time with Negroes. There are approximately 250,000 Catholics among the estimated 12,500,000 Negroes in America.

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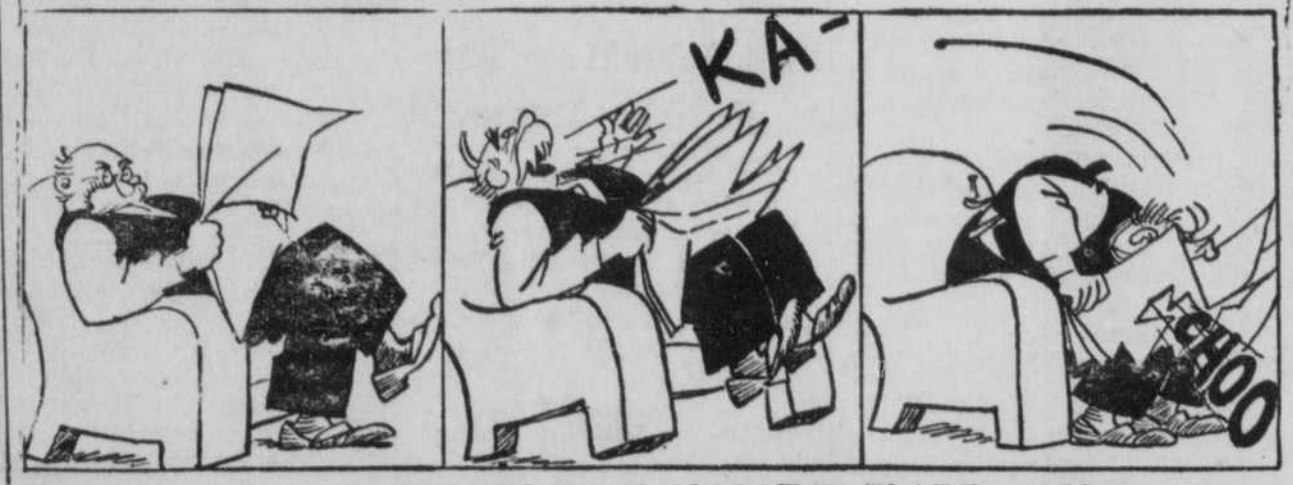
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
