Nebraska A. M. E'S Hold Conference

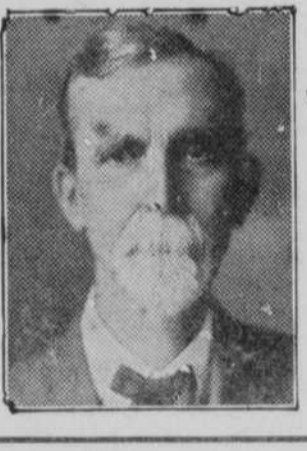
