## The Championship Race

With the seasons opening games well out of the way the gridiron warriors are digging in for five weeks of the battle royal to see who will capture the coveted honors which mark them the nation's champions.

On paper I should say that when the smoke of battle clears away, Morgan college will be in the first spot. In their early games, Morgan demonstrated that once again it has a power house. The loss of O'is the '35 ace has not weakened the team and they are bowling along in fine style.

The caliber of the opposition in the CIAA offers little in the way of stopping the Baltimoreans. Hampton is shot to pieces by graduation, ineligibility and the loss of one of its coaches, and they were the team in the pre-season dope which seemed to have the best chance to upset Morgan. A. and T. last year was purely a defensive team. Should they find an offensive drive, they may be reckoned with in the stretch drive for the honors.

Coach Rowland at Bluefield has the backs, but it is asking too much of any team to go places without a good line. The combination of "Big" Jefferson and Jimmy Moore at Virginia State will pay dividends, but I expect these to be paid in '37. Virginia Union is the question mark and we shall have to wait and see what they are going to do.

Howard under Coach Payne will probably experiment this year and build for years to come. The rest of the CIAA teams can hardly be considered in the race for the championship honors.

Down in the southeast Xavier set Alabama State right back on its heels in one of the most stunning upsets of the current season. The Alabama Hornets have them four deep in every position down in Montgomery, but this was not enough to stem the surge of the Catholics from New Orleans. Cleve Abbott with a difficult schedule ahead of him may come through with his Tuskegee team despite the Wilberforce defeat and the faltering Alabamians for the conference gonfalon, but his path is studded with obstacles.

The struggle in the southwest is in a big middle. "Zip" Gayles and his sophomores "wonder team" down at Langston served notice that they are making a determined bid for the conference championship. That 3-0 win over Wiley establishes them as the cream of that hotbed of football.

Prairie View tied Texas college, the defending champions in a scoreless tie, thus knocking them out of the picture. Southern university with Coach Mumford tutoring them for the first time bears watching, with Wiley scuffling to stay out in front.

The race in the southwest is a slam-bang affair and there is a possibility of the national championship being settled in that neck of the woods. One thing is certain, the team which wins first honors down there will have to be reckoned with for national honors. The conference is made up of teams from Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas and Oklahoma with many of the members playing opponents from Ohio and Alabama—they certainly go in for intersectional flavor down that way.

It appears that Morgan has the best chance of any of the teams of getting along without a defeat and this will mean the championship.

## Promises To "Fire" Any Who Discriminate

New York, Oct. 31 (C)—Major Edmond H. Levy, deputy marshal of the WPA, addressing the opening of WPA projects exhibits to the 369th Regiment Armory in Harlem Tuesday night, said in part: "There is something else that I would like to make clear. I am told that from time to time complaints have been made that in assigning people to WPA jobs there has been discrimination against Negro workers. I am not going to make charges against anyone for what has happened in the past. But I want to tell you, and I say this with the full approval of Col. Somervell, that if we get any proof that anyone in the Works Progress Administration denies a man or a woman who is working for WPA, because of race, color or religion; or similar miserable excuse, we'll kick him out of the organization without a moment's hesitation. And let me add that I firmly believe that there has been very little discrimination. Down in Washington we have Mr. Smith. Here in New York City we have Mr. (Lemuel L.) Foster. We have working with us a group of representative Negroes whose business it is to see that there is no discrimination. Mr. Victor F. Rieder, who was formerly the administrator here made it an outstanding feature of his administration that prejudice was out of the picture. Col. Somervell is a soldier. I am a soldier. Neither of us has to be told anything about the magnificent record of the colored man when his country called him to arms. And you can take it from me that we do not intend to let anyone besmirch that record by unfairness or discrimination in the conduct of the Works Progress Administration."

## GROESBECK SHOWS ELECTRIC PLANTS IN GOOD CONDITION

An encouraging outlook so far as earnings trend is concerned was seen by C. E. Groesbeck chairman of the board of the Electric Bond and Share Co., in his report to the annual meeting of stockholders in New York last week. Increased taxation on utilities and the prospect of further competition from government financed plants, however, threaten to retard rate reductions.

The Nebraska Power Co. is an affiliate of the Electric Bond and Share Co.

Mr. Groesbeck told the stockholders that he "earnestly hoped" some satisfactory solution of the problem of Federal competition with public utilities may be evolved from the conferences initiated recently in Washington.

"No business or industry can survive the combination of both regulation and competition at the hands of the federal government," he said.

The consumer rate payer, he said is taxed to provide money with which to build unnecessary government plants. The investor is taxed to provide money with which to destroy the very investment which provides him with income to pay taxes. The companies are taxed to provide money for the building of plants to destroy their own business.

The tax burden, both federal and local, has mounted steadily in recent years, he said. Citing the case of the American Power and Light Co. with which Nebraska Power Co. is associated, he said taxes were equal to \$14.85 for each electric customer served. The total tax burden on the Nebraska Power Co. and other companies affiliated with the Electric Bond and Share Co., for the twelve months ending with August, aggregated more than \$40,000,000. This was \$4,550,000 or 13 per cent higher than for the preceding twelve months.

Additional taxes under the Social Security Act, and material increases in accounting costs due to a new classification of accounts prescribed by the Federal Power Commission are in prospect for 1937, he said.

"Added to these impositions is the serious and devastating competition of government financed plant," stated. "Management cannot exercise control over these mounting items of expense, and they constitute a definite factor in retarding rate reductions."

## New York Daily Says Continue Scottsboro Fight to Finish

New York, Oct. 31 (C)—The New York Post, in an editorial entitled "Scottsboro Aftermath," last Friday gave reasons why the fight should be continued for the Alabama boys and Angelo Herndon. The paper said: "Americans who supported the fight to save the Scottsboro defendants from a legal lynching in Alabama may be proud of their work today. That fight won a ruling from the Supreme Court of the United States declaring that indictments handed down by Grand Jurors which systematically excluded Negroes from membership were illegal. As a result of that ruling a county judge in Meckenburg, N. C., has just quashed three indictments against Negroes. The local Grand jury, like the Alabama Grand Jury and many others in the south never had Negro members, and Judge J. Will Pless, jr., accepts the Supreme ruling as binding.

"The importance of continuing the battle on behalf of the Scottsboro defendants, Angela Herndon and other victims of repression could not be better demonstrated. The victory in Alabama has repercussions in North Carolina. Only through these long, hard struggles man the legal position of the Negro in the south be made more secure.

The various types of beauty masks which are allowed to dry on the skin and are then gently washed off are one of the most effective of the beauty treatments which can easily be administered at home.

Because they contract as they dry, they temporarily reduce the size of the pores and are therefore a great aid to the woman with an oily skin and enlarged pores. Masks also have a tendency to make the tiny lines around the eyes and mouth less noticeable, and impart a smoother, softer feeling skin.

One of the simplest and most effective beauty masks is prepared simply from the yolk of an egg, well beaten. If you wish to try this inexpensive home beauty treatment, be sure to follow these directions carefully.


First wash the face and neck thoroughly with warm water. If your skin is unusually dry, it is wise to spread a thin layer of cold cream on the face before applying the mask. In any event, spread a bit of cream around the eyes and mouth. Then spread the well-beaten egg yolk lightly over the entire face and neck except for the eyelids.

While the egg is drying on the skin, extreme care must be exercised to prevent the mask from cracking anywhere, as this destroys the whole effect. If possible, lie down immediately after applying the egg and be careful not to talk or smile, as this will crack the mask.

After the mask has thoroughly dried, remove it by rinsing the face again and again in warm water. Do not rub the face roughly while the mask is being removed as this is injurious to the delicate skin tissues.

Simply wash it off by bathing the face gently with a cloth dipped in warm water. When the mask has been completely removed, rinse the face again with clean warm water and apply either cold water or an astringent lotion to close the pores. If the skin is dry or normal, an application of cold cream or a similar face cream should be smoothed on the face after the mask treatment. If the skin is oily, however, the best tonic effects of the mask will be preserved if no cream is used.

Some women prefer to use the white of an egg for the facial treatment. It is beaten as stiff as possible and applied in exactly the same manner. If you wish to increase the effects of the egg mask, both the yolk and should be beaten separately, the white applied first, and then the yolk. The mask should remain on the face about an hour.
