RANDOLPH AND CHESTER. SPEAK TO TAMPA, FLA. LONGSHOREMEN

One of the most remarkable meetings held in Tampa, Fla., during the Convention of the American Federation of Labor, was by and for the Longshoremen. This Union is affiliated with the A. F. of L. through the International Longshoremen's Ass'n of which Joseph Ryan is president.

W. P. Webster, first international vice president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters made the main speech in which he recounted the struggle of the pullman porters to win recognition from the Pullman Co. and the National Mediator Board and the International Charter from the American Federation of Labor. He stirred an audience of five hundred Negro Longshoremen to high enthusiasm when he stated that the Negroes of the south were held down by any imaginary fear and that the organized Negro workers such as the Longshoremen and the Pullman Porters, and workers SPR. ers and not Preachers, business or professional men, had to lead the Negro race out of mental slavery. Webster continued that the time had come for the Negro worker to realize that they could not depend upon the co-called friends, white or black, but that they had to depend upon themselves to effect the solution of their economic problems, to raise their wages, reduce hours of work and improve their working conditions.

Mr Phillip Randolph, International President of the Brotherhood counseled that organization was the main road to economic security and power

Mr. E. Rhone, International Organizer of the International Longshoremen Ass'n. located at Mobile, Ala., gave an interesting talk to Longshoremen in terms of their practical craft problems.

This Union of Longshoremen is only one year old and now has a membership of 1,000 or more men, with a few whites who contrary to the traditional custom in the south, meet with the Negroes in the same hall and don't sit on opposite sides of the hall but they all sit together.

The immediate problem of this Union is to develop a closed shop and raise their pay approximating the level of other ports. The president is J. L. Lavell, secretary Michael Lazarus and the vice president Percy Harvey.

Columbus, O., Dec. 2 (C)—The Ohio Supreme court ruled Thursday that operators of retail stores may refuse to sell merchandise to Negroes when it refused to review a decision of the Cuyahoga County Court of Appeals, which held that women's apparel shop in the Terminal Building, Cleveland, was within its rights in refusing to sell to Miss Ellen Sissle, colored, The Court of Appeals reversed a decision of the Cleveland Municipal court, which awarded Miss Sissle \$100 damages. The Appeals Court held "retail stores are private business not within the provisions of the civil rights statute."


