ceive any compensation for any service rendered this organization with possible exception of secretary whose compensation, if any, shall be fixed by the Bacchanite Club.

6. A majority vote of the council shall govern, except where otherwise provided.

7. They shall hold regular meetings semi-monthly.

8. They shall hold special meetings when called by the president of the Bacchanite Club or by the chairman of the council.

9. A primary election shall be held in December of each year, the date and place to be determined by the Bacchanite Club.

10. A general election shall be held in December of each year, the date and place to be determined by the Bacchanite Club.

11. The chairman of the council will take his office on or about the 15th of January of each year.

12. The councilmen shall be appointed by the Bacchanite club each year and will take their office the same time as the chairman.

Memphis, Jan. 9 (ANP)—The sluggish, muddy Mississippi, famed Ole Man River of verse and song, has again come into his own with the present great increase in cotton traffic brought about by a production estimated at six times as large as last year's.

Arkansas Would Change Lynchings From Nine to Eight

Little Rock, Jan. 9 (ANP)—If the state of Arkansas has its way, the 1936 total lynching figures released last week by Tuskegee institute will be reduced from nine to eight. Arkansas wants to throw one of the two mobbings charged against the state.

The bone of contention is the Frank Weems mystery, which came to light last spring during the cotton chopper's strike in eastern Arkansas, instigated by the Southern Tenant Farmers union. The union charged that Weems had been lynched in Crittenden county for participation in the strike.

It was while investigating the sharecropper's disappearance that Miss Willie Sue Blagden of Memphis and the Rev. Claude Williams of Little Rock, both white were flogged. Sheriff J. H. Curlin immediately declared Weems was "alive and will be produced when the time comes" but that time has not yet come. Supt. Albright of the state rangers investigated the affairs under direct orders of Gov. Futrell but could get no definite information.

tection against storms. The power company also will carry on active farm line construction program as they have for several years past. It is the hope of the company to connect up at least as many farms as during 1935. J. E. Davidson, president of the company, said.

As a result of the sale of electrical appliances of all kinds by dealers which has reached the largest volume in many years, a record of new uses for electricity in homes served by the company was shown during 1935. These increased appliance sales, Mr. Davidson said, are the result of cooperative advertising and selling between all dealers of electrical appliances in the communities served by the power company. 1935 also brought to the Power company the largest number of residential customers in the company's history, according to Mr. Davidson.

The Nebraska Power Co., also during 1935, made the outstanding safety record among power and light companies in the United States.

"The past year has been an active one for our company in making electricity of greater service to our customers and in building greater payrolls," said Mr. Davidson.
