LINCOLN NEWS

The legislature is having quite a time getting properly set up. But at last machinery is about ready to enter into the regular routine of legislative work. The three important committees have at last been appointed to arrange the order of payments for the legislators, and employees. The general sentiment is that the janitor force should be paid in keeping with other financial conditions which has shown decided improvements this year over former years since 1929. At least \$5.00 per day which would assure them a little less than their actual expenses during the legislative period. The first report the committee made was \$10,000 for the current expenses; second, \$75,000 for salaries. They also passed a measure as to the method and time of payments on the senators salaries. The rules of procedure have been established, and the senators are now turning their attention to bills already introduced and the work of drafting more needed legislation. Miss Dorothy Scott, the first race clerk ever connected with the Nebraska legislature, is readily becoming acquainted with her work, as well as with the Lincoln people and others with whom she has to work. Mr. Trago McWilliams has charge of the cloakroom and as usual he is ingratiating himself into the goodwill and respect of the senators and the public charge who are daily brought into contact with his department. Rev. S. S. Whitlow has seemingly become a fixture during the Nebraska legislative period. Mr. Harry Bradley, the head custodian, who has the responsibility of arranging the furniture and other supplies that are used by the law makers and clerks, shows the strain of the great responsibility with which he has to deal, seemingly everybody and everything connected with the legislature must come by Harry.

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child. Later he was wedded to Miss Lulu Robinson, now his widow. He was an active member of the Iroquois Lodge of the Independent Benevolent Protective Order of Elks of the World and for several years operated the Jazzland restaurant and cabaret on South Thirteenth street.

He traveled and as known intimately in the principal cities of the country, particularly Chicago, Detroit, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia; New York, Toledo and various points in Ohio. He came here about twelve years ago and was familiarly known along the stroll as "Daddy" Green, owner of the Smoke Shop on East 55th street near Central avenue.

Friend To All

He made many lasting friends here. He had only one known fault; that of a charity that not only saw the needs of others, but gave until he felt he had lifted a burden from the heart of a fellow man. Never was there a night nor a day too stormy for "Daddy" Green to respond to the call of a friend or neighbor in distress. He could always be depended upon in trouble or need.

He was stricken Tuesday December 29th and Friday, January 1st, he was taken to the Cleveland City hospital. But when the ambulance called refused to be carried from his room in the Majestic Hotel on the stretchers. He said, "This may be the last time I walk out of here, but I'll walk just the same," and he did, though his temperature was 103 degrees. He had lived here five years.

Friends Loyal

When the news of his death was flashed about the city, many of his friends and associates came to the Arthur Wynne's Funeral Home and offered unlimited sums of money, even to the hundreds of dollars, to see that "Daddy" Green was given a respectable funeral. But Tom Elliot of New York, husband of the bereaved daughter, Mrs. Leona Green-Elliott, came to the front and shouldered the entire responsibility, as he expressed the sincere appreciation of the family for the loyalty shown "Daddy" Green, who had in life befriended so many.
