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Omaha "U" Building to be Completed in '38

The general ground plan, and style of architecture, and the number and location of buildings on the new municipal university of Omaha campus were decided on last week by the regents.

The decisions followed a visit to Omaha by Paul Gret, internationally recognized architect of Philadelphia, who has been engaged as consulting architect for the new university buildings. Among the best known buildings designed by Mr. Gret are the Pan-American building in Washington, the Folgers Liberty there, the Hall of Science at the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago, and various college buildings at the universities of Texas, Wisconsin and Pennsylvania.

He styled the Zephyr streamlined train, and had never seen the completed work until he came to Omaha.

Only one building will be built at the present time, according to the regents. It will be an H-shaped building of early Georgian style, facing Dodge street. Library and science laboratories will be built into the building. There will be no gymnasium at present. The building will stand on the highest part of the new campus site.

Construction will begin as soon as the weather permits. The regents expect the building to be finished during the summer of 1938.

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BEAUTY AND ROMANCE by Marie Downing

The Larieuse Beauty Foundation was established by the Godefroy Manufacturing Company to study methods of preserving women's natural beauty, and to make the results of this research available to the public.

In our last column, we learned that girls with slender faces should wear their hair smoothed on top and fluffed or waved at the sides; it should cover part of the forehead, but not the cheeks.

What about the girl with a round, full face?

Her problem is just the opposite. If she wears bangs or a wave over her forehead, it will make her face look even wider than it really is, so she must comb the hair back from her brows, whether she wears a part or not. For the girl with a fleshy face, a side-part is usually better than a center part or none at all.

Because her cheeks are too wide, some sort of flat curl should be worn well forward in front of the ears to cut down this area. However, the hair at the side of the head, over the ears, must be smooth. Any roll or wave over the ears will increase the apparent width of her face. The ears should be covered, however, as this makes the face look narrower.

A coronet braid or a cluster of curls above her forehead or on top of her head will help make her face look slender. It will also increase her height, and this is usually desirable because the round, fleshy face frequently goes with a short, plump figure.

Frequently the round fleshy face is the result of excess weight, and common sense dieting and exercise

will slenderize the contours of the face until it becomes more oval. Some girls, however, have wide cheekbones and wide jawbones, and no amount of reducing will change this broad, square type of face.

If you fall into this latter type, the rules for your coiffure are about the same as those given for the round-faced girl. Your hair should be combed back to show the full height of your forehead, and flat curls should be worn on the cheeks. The center-part may be worn if your features are regular; otherwise, part the hair on the side and bring it back diagonally, off the forehead.

A mass of curls at the top of the head, or any other arrangement that will add to the height of the face, should be adopted. Soft curls at the temples and near the angles of the jaws will make the square contours of the face less angular.

With both the wide face and the round face, emphasize the natural hairline across the forehead, especially if it has an attractive "widow's peak."

Avoid a short, fluffy bob, and above all don't experiment with bangs.

Whatever your type of face—experiment. Follow the rules given in this column and the preceding one. Study the different effects created when you change the place of your part, or the arrangement of curls.

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
