Accident Facts and Safety Teaching

The passing of winter means that our highways are again crowded with automobile traffic. The teaching of safety offers many practical suggestions. The approach of spring again focuses our attention on outdoor accidents and also brings to our minds, to review the study of street and highway safety, and the emphasis unplaced on the seriousness of the automobile accident problem. Motor vehicles, accidents in 1935 amounted to 36,400 fatalities, 10,500 were permanently injured and there were 118,000 temporary disabilities. To help avoid these calamities and these conditions simple rules for safety and street highways must be followed:

1. Watch and obey the traffic signals.
2. Obey the traffic officer—he is your friend.
3. Play on the ground or on the sidewalk—never in the streets.
4. Avoid doing the three things which cause most accidents to children; darting out into the streets; running from behind parked cars; failure to wait until the road is clear.
5. Face front when getting off a street car.
6. Obey traffic regulations when riding a bicycle
7. Choose safe hills for coasting—never slide where there is traffic.
8. Never walk or play on railroad tracks or trestles.
9. Hold your umbrella high on rainy days. This safeguards children and from school.
