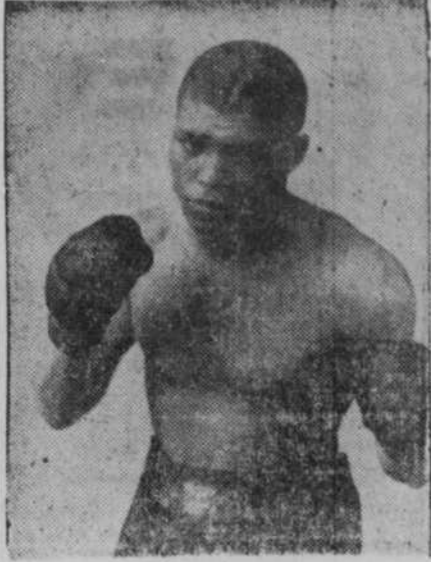
Leonard Starnes will return next season and play in Al Randall's place as center. James Anders is also expecting to go in line with his pals this fall. His position is forward.

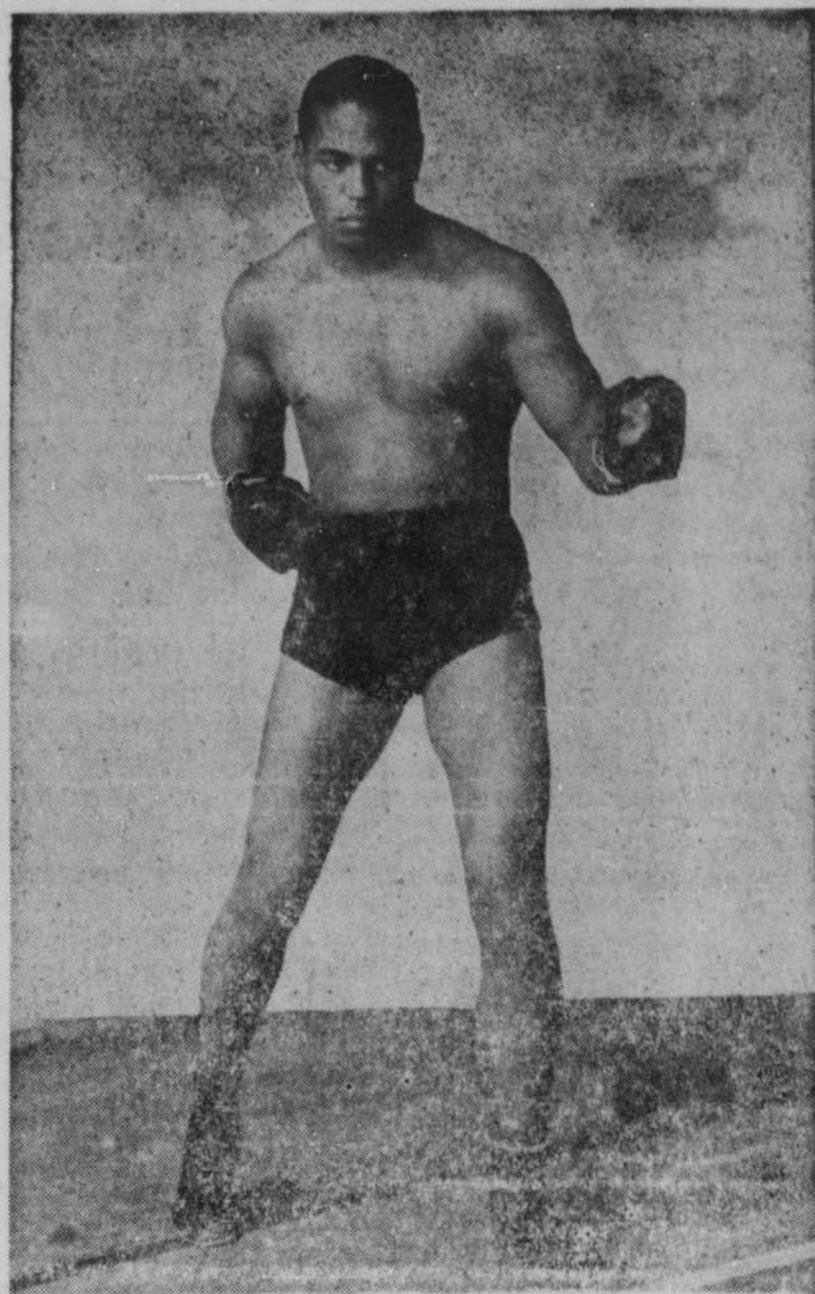

John Henry Lewis, Arizona college graduate and light heavyweight champion of the world who is scheduled to trade punches with Harold "Millionaire" Murphy at the City Auditorium next Tuesday, April 13, has led a brilliant fighting career and is claimed by many as being the greatest fighter today at any weight. The king of the light heavyweight division does not smoke, drink or indulge in any night life gaiety but attends church every Sunday which has earned for him the title "Fighting Deacon."

The Lewis fighting instinct can be traced back several generations. Tom Molemeaux, his great great grandfather is said to have whipped all comers in both Europe and America.

The champ is twenty-three years old and financially independent; has met and defeated some of the leading fighters of the day including James J. Braddock and Bob Olin from whom he wrested the light heavyweight crown.

His father and brother operate a thriving restaurant and gymnasium in Oakland, Calif., which he set up for them recently. He is also sending his younger brother to Howard University.

Aside from mitt-slinging, his favorite diversion is playing the piano. He is said to have a technique all of his own. His training quarters and home are both equipped with pianos.
