### MARCH BREAKS RECORD FOR MONTH FOR WOW

All previous records for single month's insurance production for Woodmen of the World Life Insurance association were broken during March, according to announcement of the general offices of the association last week.

The occasion was a "President's Month" campaign honoring De Emmett Bradshaw, president of the association. A total of \$29,117,712 of insurance was written during the month. This was an increase of more than four and a half million dollars over the total for a similar campaign conducted in March 1936, which produced \$24,500,000.

Over 2,300 local camps of the association in forty-four states and the District of Columbia participated in the campaign, and over half this number qualified for special awards by recording \$5,000 or more in new insurance written during the month.

The closing day of the campaign, March 31, produced the argest day's insurance business ever recorded, \$9,997,402.

Woodmen of the World is rated as being the strongest life insurance association, financially in the world. It now has over \$425,000,000 of insurance in force and its assets now exceed \$125,000,000.
