Recently three of them are reported to have gone to Washington to plead with PWA officials to keep \$56,200, which was to be used to build a school. It is their religious belief to live independent of outsiders so they flatly refused \$56,200 because it was a gift from the government, and furthermore, the school would have been too far to walk and these Amishmen don't want their children to ride a school bus but rather that they walk as did their grandfathers.

Northside "Y"

The more serious minded, far-seeing women of our group, had for many years seen the very great need of an association to draw the young people together in an interesting and agreeable body—so they set about putting this idea into execution. The other groups had such an association and had met such a splendid success—why could not our people do likewise?

We have always been very successful in finding friends among the white race and the ladies felt that now was a most needed time to solicit their aid.

Get Aid from Central Branch
These prominent active women of the colored groups, together with the aid of the more liberal minded white persons headed by Mrs. Casper Yost Ofitt, were able to bring into existence their great desire.

In the year 1920 through their untiring efforts, the initial funds were raised and they purchased the splendid building at the corner of 22nd and Grant Streets.

The building was properly renovated and the surrounding grounds had to be landscaped. Work in this direction was done by the "Garden Club" organized for that special purpose.

They landscaped the lawn, and planted flowers and laid permanent walks leading to the building. In fact the Garden Club so beautified the grounds that it became the most dynamic single factor in challenging public attention at that time.

Each member of the club made a contribution both noble and rare in her own way—presenting dramas, style reviews, concerts and dinners which were no less helpful than unique.

Instituted at first to function as a YWCA, it served the community in a much larger way, in that it served as a Community center for the public and all other organizations in its environs—churches, lodges, women's clubs, boy scouts, fraternal societies, NAACP. This association also presented distinguished men and women to all groups, thereby making it the largest single agency in propagating culture within its constituency.

The YWCA in the course of years has aided in bringing such musical artists as Roland Hayes and Madam Evanti to the community in concert; the historian, Carter G. Woodson; the sociologist and economist, Dr. George E. Haynes; the orator and scribe, William Pickens; Walter White, Mrs. Paul Lawrence Dunbar Nelson, and many other prominent persons.

Miss Fannie B. Watkins was

the first secretary, followed by Miss Edna May Stratton, who served for several years. She was an accomplished musician both in piano and voice and during her years of service the membership reached 700.

Miss Margie L. Danley was next sent to serve. She came with the wisdom and tact that to her with her maturer years. With her as secretary, the "Y" entered its influence through the whole countryside and she no less than the "Y" itself became a part of everything that had for its goal the real need of the colored people and the cause which the "Y" had come to serve.

Miss Rachael Taylor was also secretary and served quite as fine as the rest. She went to other fields to serve and labor, blessing them she but casually met and them she so generously and nobly served. Miss Gladys Pullum is now the secretary. You will continue to give her your support in this most wonderful institution of culture and refinement, ever manifesting an interest in the work and remembering that our future depends upon the oncoming generation and our desire to be recognized as a race with the highest ideals.
