CLOTHES CAN MAKE YOU LOOK TALL OR SHORT

Now that spring is here and summer is just around the corner, women everywhere are studying the fashion notes to make sure that their new summer clothes will conform to the very latest, up-to-the-minute styles.

But the wise shopper thinks of something more than style. She also asks herself, "Is this particular style becoming to me? Is it suited to my type of figure?"

Girls who are shorter or taller than the average must be particularly careful. If you are considerably under the average height, you will not look your best in a dress that emphasizes your shortness, no matter how stylish the dress may be.

Choosing Your Dress

An old, reliable rule to follow is this: Short girls should wear clothing with up-and-down lines, either in the cut of the garment or the design of the goods, while tall girls should wear ensembles which emphasize the crosswise lines.

To get some idea on how important this rule is, draw two ovals, shaped like eggs standing on end, on two different pieces of paper. Then draw half a dozen up-and-down lines through one of them, and draw cross-wise lines across the other. The oval with the vertical lines will look slender, and the one with the horizontal lines will seem shorter and wider. In exactly the same way, crosswise stripes will make you look shorter and wider; up-and-down stripes will make you look taller and more slender.

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LAMB CHOPS WITH ORANGES Trim the fat from thick chops and dip each one in melted butter. Oil broiler well and broil the chops eight minutes. Turn the chops, place a slice of orange on each and broil eight minutes longer. Sprinkle generously with salt and paprika and serve very hot, garnish with sliced oranges.

CHEESE SOUFFLE

3 eggs 1 cup milk 1-2 cups soft bread crumbs 1 T. melted butter 3-4 cup grated cheese Salt and pepper Separate eggs—beat yolks and add warm milk. Pour over bread crumbs and cheese. Fold in whites stiffly beaten. Pour in baking dish set in pan of hot water. Bake in moderate oven for about 25 minutes.

PORCUPINE SALAD

12 halves of Pears 4 Pkgs. cream cheese 1 teaspoon onion juice 1-2 teaspoon salt Dash Cayenne pepper 1 cup almonds 2 heads lettuce 1 lemon Mash cheese. Season with cayenne, salt and onion juice. Squeeze lemon juice over pears and let stand a few minutes. Drain pears before putting on lemon juice. When ready fill pears with cheese. Shred lettuce. Place pears with cheese side down and split almonds and stick in pears to look like porcupines and cover with French dressing.

CARMEL STRUDDLE

1-2 cup butter 1-2 cup brown sugar. 1 cup flour 1-4 cup white sugar 1-4 cup water 1 t. of lemon juice Cinnamon and apples Cream butter and sugar. Work flour in. Peel apples and place in a bowl. Make syrup of white sugar and water. Pour over apples. Sprinkle pastry over and bake until apples are done. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream.

The Cuban Cosmetic company is owned and operated exclusively by colored people.

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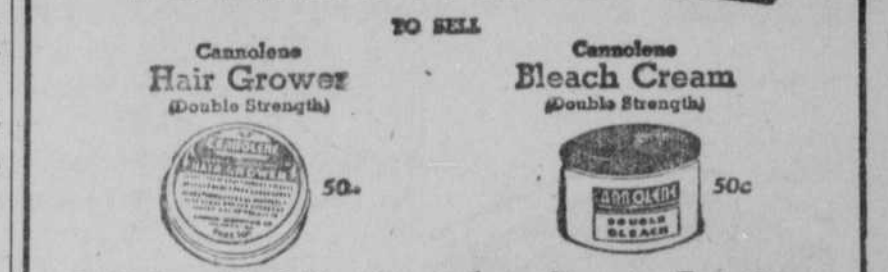
