(meaning of course that they were colored.) Incidentally a grand daughter of Jefferson is a friend of the writer. Her name is Mrs. Kelly of Streno street, Cincinnati.

Mrs. Kelly is the daughter of the late Peter Fausset, one of Cincinnati's most outstanding Negro citizens and widely known as "the son of the framers of the Declaration of Independence.

Donald Jones, Ernest Lagon and Richard Thornton, colored, are rated among the most skillful butchers of greater Cincinnati according to the book "Cincinnati's Colored Citizens" by W. P. Dabney. "Alexander Hamilton bosom friend of George Washington and the greatest Secretary of the Treasury the United States ever had, is the real founder of its financial system, was a colored man.

Approximately 5,000 Negroes served in the American Army in the Revolutionary War.
