Goldman to Condot 400-Piece Band Here

Edwin Franko Goldman, generally regarded as the outstanding bandmaster of the world since the death of John Philip Sousa, will lead a massed band of four hundred pieces and a massed chorus of five hundred voices in concert at the Municipal auditorium in Omaha, Sunday afternoon, June 6th, at 2:30 p. m. The concert will be held in observance of the fiftieth anniversary of the Salvation Army in Omaha.

In the massed band will be the Salvation Army staff band from Chicago, the all-city high school 175-piece band of Omaha, the band of Omaha Post No. 1, American Legion, the 168th Infantry band of Council Bluffs, the state championship band from Wahoo, and others. The 50-voice chorus will be recruited from the local high schools, and will include the personnel of the nationally famous Central high school A'capella choir. Lytton Davis director of music in the Omaha public schools, is assembling the band and chorus.

The Rotary club of Omaha has assumed sponsorship of the concert, and Frank D. Shields is general chairman of the Rotary committee.

Mr. Goldman will fly to Omaha from his home in New York City at his own expense. A close personal friend of Sousa, he is organizer and director of the famous Goldman band, which is in its nineteenth season of concerts on the Central Park mall in New York City. A brilliant arranger and leader, Mr. Goldman is also author of more than eighty original compositions, of which "On the Mall" is perhaps the most famous.

Mr. Goldman is also author of two standard textbooks on band, and is recipient of innumerable honorary degrees and other distinctions.

All seats for the Goldman concert will be sold for twenty-five cents, and none will be reserved. All proceed will be turned over to the Salvation Army to finance golden anniversary events.

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Let Contracts For Omaha University

Contracts totaling \$635,538.50 for the construction, electrical wiring and fixtures, and plumbing and ventilation of the first unit of the University of Omaha, at its new site on West Dodge street, were awarded by the Board of Regents at its meeting Friday morning. Work of construction will actually start Monday, according to John Latenser, architect.

Mr. Latenser stated that, while the actual costs were higher than estimated when the plans were drawn up last winter, the increase in cost is due to the increased costs of labor and materials. In spite of the higher cost, the total cost of the unit is well within the amount which was allowed for the construction and the contracts have already received the informal approval of PWA officials.

The contract for the general construction was awarded to A. Borchman Sons and totaled \$469,025. The plumbing, heating and ventilation contract went to J. J. Hanighen company, the contract price being \$88,946. The contract for electric fixtures and installation was awarded to the E. C. Bennett Electric company for \$27,567.50.

In adjourning the meeting, Mr. F. T. B. Martin, chairman of the Board, expressed hope that contractors would patronize local concerns for their purchase of materials and supplies for the job.


In the matter of the estate of LULA R. THOMAS, deceased.
