Arithmetic

Answers:

1. Addition is the process of finding the combined amount of two or more numbers. Ex. 2 plus 2 equals 4.
2. Subtraction is the process of finding the difference between two numbers by taking the smaller of the two from the larger. Ex. 6 minus 3 equals 3.
3. Multiplication is the process of multiplying one given number by another. Ex. 4 times 2 equals 8.
4. Division is the process of finding how many times one number is contained in a second number. Ex. 72 divide by 12 equals 6.

9. Every member must be a real booster of The Omaha Guide and agree to interest at least 5 grown-ups in purchasing The Omaha Guide.

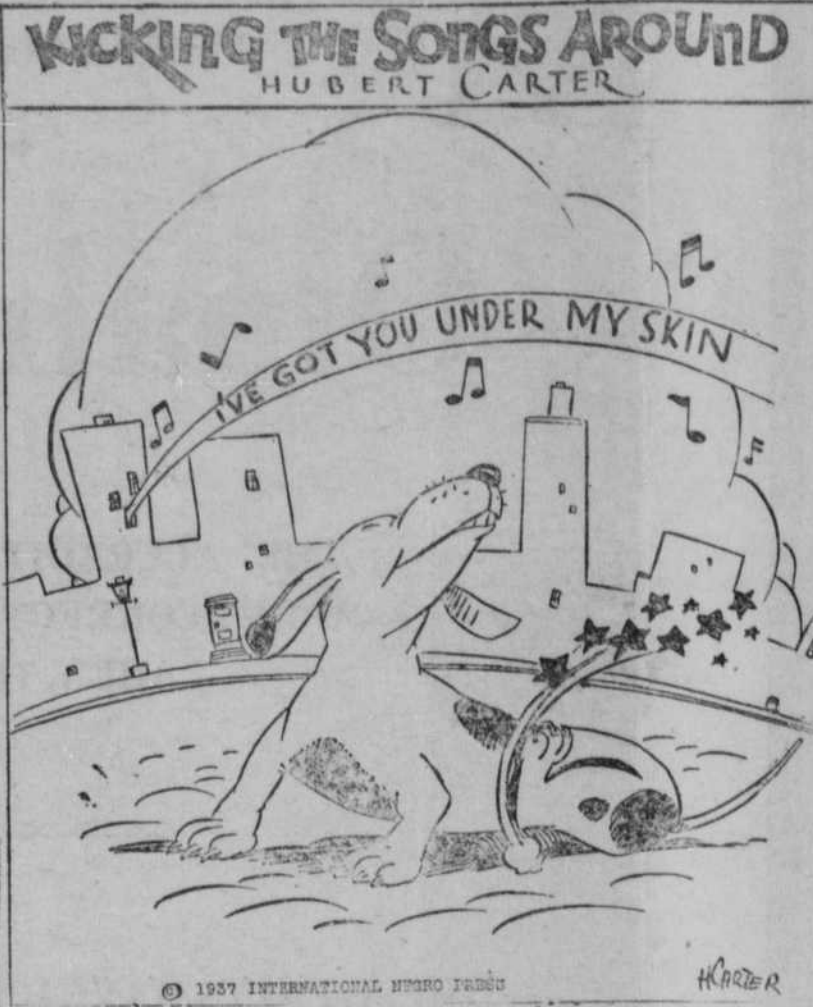
The Guidite World of Music

Works of John Philip Sousa
John Philip Sousa received much of his inspiration through travel. His most popular march "The Stars and Stripes Forever" is probably the best known. This music came to him in its entirety, during an ocean voyage, enroute from Naples to New York, the tune kept running through his mind. On arrival in America, he set the composition down on paper exactly as it had been played by his "brain band," and not a single note has ever been changed.

For his first marches he received little or nothing. Full right for both "The Washington Post March" and the "High School Cadets March" brought only thirty-five dollars each. It has been estimated that from all sources combined, the "Stars and Stripes Forever" earned the composer over three hundred thousand dollars.

The great bandmaster's "Semper Parvulus," the march of the United States Marine Corps and Frances Scott Keys, "Star Spangled Banner" are the only two pieces of music officially recognized by the United States government. While the "Stars and Stripes Forever" is not as yet officially recognized, no other composition is more representative of the American spirit.
