Legion to Show Fireworks Exhibit at Creighton Stadium

Fireworks are limited to Fourth of July celebrations in the United States but in Omaha they are almost completely forbidden because of the danger of injury to children. With the approach of Independence Day, police and doctors have already been called into service, in places where fireworks have been prohibited.

Only exception to the Omaha ordinance banning fireworks is an amendment permitting a careful supervised pyrotechnic display July 5th at Creighton stadium, sponsored by Omaha Post No. 1, the American Legion, the world's largest Legion post. They are working with a number of other posts in metropolitan centers which forbid private use of fireworks to provide for an Independence Day celebration for the public.

Ed McGinnis, Cook County post official and Chicago financier who visited in Omaha this week, told George Gillan, Omaha Post adjutant, and Morris E. Jacobs, chairman of the finance committee, of throngs attracted to the annual Legion exhibition at Soldiers Field, Chicago, each year. Los Angeles Legion organization have extended their fireworks show this year to a two-night program to meet public demand.

Fireworks were first introduced in America by some Spanish conquistadores in Mexico with Cortez in 1520. Many intricate designs symbolizing religious and patriotic events have grown up. Omaha officials have been meeting regularly this week with fireworks engineers in creating displays of prominent historical figures in American life and "set pieces" to depict pioneer days in the Middle West.

One huge figure pictures an Indian attack on a prairie schooner caravan, drawn up for night's encampment. Blueprints also call for fireworks doll and clowns, made up as dancers and acrobats and figures from comic strips. One design calls for a man doll turning an ice cream freezer, another for acrobats spinning on a trapeze. Birds at the top of poles light up, spread their wings and fly off into space. Another plan calls for a large figure of a boy to light a giant cracker and be blown to pieces by the torpedo-like explosion.

SUMMER PRECAUTIONS FOR YOUR HAIR

Summer is hard on the hair. We often make it worse by neglecting to wear hats during the long summer days, leaving our crowning glory exposed to the scorching gaze of old Sol for many long hours. Swimming, tennis, golf and other summer sports are so interesting that we forget about the hair and scalp, until, in the fall, the cruel awakening comes. Hair, which had once been a source of pride and joy, is unruly, dull and lifeless. Then we realize that it will take most of the winter to make it beautiful again.

To save time and worry later, work out a routine for the care of your hair during the summer. Be sure that it is simple and suited to your requirements, then stick to it. Study your hair carefully, decide whether it is dry or oily, whether the part is flattering. Decide on the time of day most convenient for brushing, and the time of week that is most suitable for your shampoo. Have your schedule so well fitted into your personal time-budget that it will come as naturally as lunch, even on the sweltering days.

Frequent Shampoos

Cleanliness is the basic requirement, of course. When hair is immaculate, even the most casual coiffure will look becoming, for clean lustrous hair is beautiful in itself. Dull, poorly kept hair is a handicap which no woman should tolerate.

Shampoo your hair as often as you find necessary. Don't stick to the "one-week" or "ten-day" rules. They do not always apply. Your requirements may differ from those of your neighbor. During the summer you will certainly need to shampoo your hair more frequently than in the winter. If you find that frequent shampooing in the summer over-stimulates the oil glands, try an occasional dry shampoo, perhaps egg-white, or one of the good commercial products. If you shampoo incorrectly and infrequently, seldom using a hairbrush, you simply won't

have the kind of hair that poets rave about.

Oil Treatment Essential

Heat and dryness will demand an occasional oil treatment to keep your hair soft and lustrous. This is also a good emergency treatment, after a day at the beach, to replace natural oils, "gone with the wind." The oil treatment is especially good if your hair is too dry just after a shampoo and has a tendency to become too oily later.

Olive oil is one of the oldest beauty preparations and is still recognized as an effective and inexpensive aid to parched scalps. Vigorous scalp massage should be considered an important part of the oil treatment. Avoid using a high degree of artificial heat in drying, especially when there is a tendency toward dry scalp and brittle hair. Give yourself the treatment once each month, and the scalp will defy summer temperatures.

Brushes and combs should be immaculate. A thorough scrubbing in warm suds is due them at least once a week. If possible, dry in the sun, for this will prolong the life of brushes and keep the combs, as well as brushes, sanitary.

Keep your coiffure simple, so that it will take little of your time. Have it flattering to you even though it is not the current "rage." Too often we see a girl wearing an unflattering hairdress just because it is the fad. She would out-smart her sisters if she would stick to the becoming thing—a simple style that complements her features. Remember, soft gleaming hair is beautiful even when simply dressed. If you become bored with the routine you have set for yourself, make some changes. Try a new curl, a new rinse or a new part. It is important to keep yourself interested in these things, for if you are not, who will be?

Conscientious care of the hair will add immeasurably to your appearance and self-confidence. They are well worth the time taken to achieve them. Don't you think so?
