### Last Minute Snappy News Items From National Field

Havana, Cuba—Col Fulgencia Batista, head of the nation's military forces and the dictator of Cuba last Sunday outlined his three-year social, political and economic plan, touching almost every phase of national life. Some of his proposed projects: establishment of agricultural, civil military and rural schools, construction of hospitals, anti-tuberculosis and anti-cancer campaigns, enactment of pure-food legislation, coordination of the sugar industry and regulation of tobacco, coffee, cattle and mining industries.

Georgetown, Del.—The Sussex county jail term of a colored trusty, Luther Tingle, was doubtless cut down last Sunday, when he foiled the attempted jail break of seven prisoners, who had menaced four guards, obtained the keys to the main prison gate, and "shot up" the dining room. Grabbing a shot gun, Trusty Tingle fired at the mutiners, finally drove them back to the dining room and held them there until State police arrived. He was highly praised by Warden Hugh Smith and Deputy Warden Charles McCabe, the latter narrowly escaping injury in the melee when his trouser leg was clipped by a prisoner's bullet.

Washington, D. C.—Two fights—one over a dime, the other a lovers' quarrel—resulted last week in the death of two men. One unidentified, was shot to death during an altercation over a dime, in front of a Seventh avenue ice cream parlor; police claim to know his slayer. The other victim, William Watson, stabbed in the chest during an alleged lovers' quarrel, was found to be dead on arrival at Casualty hospital. Police held Marie Collier, 24, as the alleged knife-wielder.

Columbia, S. C.—The new "Big Apple Dance," latest dance craze to sweep the country, had its origin here, according to University of South Carolina students, who claim the got the idea while in the gallery of a local colored night club watching the finger-snapping swing steps of the dancers. They copied the dance, called it "Big Apple," after the name of the night club. The dance is said to be a combination of the old Charleston, drags, swing steps, rumba, and truck, with a little of the Virginia Reel thrown in for good measure.

#### TAILOR MAKE YOUR EYEBROWS

Eyebrows contribute so much to the expression of the eyes and face that they are deserving of more care than the average person gives them. The day of the "pencil" line eyebrow that was only a fine thin line is past, because to delete the eyebrows to a marching line of hairs is to rob the face of character and softness. It's a trick that makes a girl look hard and brittle. An eyebrow is really an eyebrow again—but this does not mean that eyebrows may run wild. Careful plucking with tweezers is necessary to make them look neat and well-kept.

The shaping of the eyebrows may be done either at home or at the beauty shop. If you pluck your own, apply a generous amount of cold cream or vaseline to the brows and brush them into shape before you do any "tweezing." Then it is important to remember to pluck only those stray hairs above and below the natural center line. After the plucking has been completed, apply witch hazel to close the pores. Make sure the tweezer is clean; sterilize if possible.

Daily Care  
Eyebrows should be brushed morning and night and each time you cleanse your face during the day with a small stiff brush. This brushing stimulates growth and adds lustre, besides training the eyebrows to lie in their proper alignment. It also gets rid of powder which clings to the roots of the hair and looks untidy. The first strokes should be toward the nose to remove powder; the second brushing should be toward the temples to lay the hairs smoothly and evenly in place.

If your eyebrows are becoming thin and dull, start caring for them daily, now! Eyebrows respond beautifully to care, but disastrously to neglect. Don't allow a day to pass that you don't apply plain vaseline or castor oil to them.

Skillful use of an eyebrow pencil can make the brows appear longer and more attractive. After all other make-up has been finished, apply eyebrow pencil in short light strokes toward the temples. Be careful not to overdo it. If it is applied too heavily, it may spoil the effect of that certain naturalness we all strive for. The secret of all successful make-up is invisibility, so the secret of using eyebrow pencil effectively is to apply it only to the hairs themselves, never on the skin.

For Stubborn Brows  
Fuzzy, untidy eyebrows are not attractive, and show lack of care. If your eyebrows are so unruly that they do not respond to brushing, the following procedure should help you: Mix a small quantity of corn-starch with enough cold water to form a quick smooth paste. Then, before retiring at night brush the eyebrows into shape and apply the paste to them. Permit the corn-starch mixture to remain on all night and remove it the following morning with warm water and soft cloth. To counteract any drying effect apply vaseline to the eyebrows.

Eyebrows play an important role in the drama of social beauty. They should go romantic, which means that they should be as nature intended them—with modern improvements.

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
