In an effort to have Nebraska keep its place as a state of safe driving, all person operating a car beginning with the first of September will be required to prove several things very difficult to representatives of the State Department of Motor Vehicles, including the following:

- 1. That they have reasonably good eyesight.
2. That they have no physical defects that would impair their ability to drive well
Face Examination
Persons who do not have driver's licenses prior to Sept. 1st, will have to prove even more than the foregoing. They will have to submit to a written examination on Nebraska Motor Vehicles laws and a driving test over a course approximately one mile long.
Persons possessing the old type of driving licenses will be charged 75 cents for the new type. Persons applying for licenses for the first time must pay a \$1.00 fee.
Examinations must be taken between Sept. 1st and Nov. 30th. inclusive.
