Two Youths Win Urban League Award

New York, Aug. 26 (PFS)—The National Urban League has announced through its executive secretary, Eugene Kinkle Jones, the awarding of two Fellowships of \$1,000 each for study in social work to William Y. Bell, jr., of New York, and John Caswell Smith, jr., of Philadelphia. Bell has been assigned to the Graduate School of the University of Pittsburgh, and Smith to the New York School of Social Work. Bell, graduate of Northwestern university, studied for one year in the School of Religion at Howard university, Washington, D. C. Smith, who is at present head worker of the Wharton Settlement in Philadelphia, is a graduate of Springfield college. Since organization of the National Urban League in 1910, eighty-two Fellowships have been awarded to Negro students all of whom have been engaged in welfare work in many sections of the country. The Fellowship Committee of the National Urban League of which Miss Dorothy Straus is chairman is chairman, selected the successful candidates from a total of eighty-seven contestants.

Philadelphia, Aug. 26 (ANP)—The Sunday School Union of the African Methodist Episcopal church has moved from Nashville to the new AME Publishing House Building here pursuant to an order entered after a unanimous vote of the Bishops at the recent Bishops at the recent Bishop's Council in Memphis. Plans have been perfected under E. A. Selby who succeeded Ira T. Bryant as secretary of the Sunday School Union to issue all church literature from Philadelphia. It is expected by this move to divert from Mr. Bryant the lucrative Sunday school supply business. Secretary Selby announces that literature is ready for distribution and has sent out an appeal to all pastors to obey their bishop's ruling and patronize the official publishing house.
