Leroy Haynes, also once rated as a bright light in the fistie firmament, scored a technical kayo over Bob Olin in the sixth round of the semi-final contest. The bout was a bitterly contested one and Olin was so peeved at the referee for halting the contest that he wrestled him to the ground. At the Rockland Palace last Saturday night, Jersey Joe Walcott, who was the winner of the Jack Dempsey's heavyweight tournament, kayoed Elmer Ray in the third round of a scheduled six round main event. In another six, King Kong Matthews, Harlem's latest fistie thrill kayoed Phil Serriol in the first round... Tiger Leroy Smith, making his Harlem debut at the arena, got the nod over Jose Rodriguez in a rough six rounder and George Brothers, international Golden Gloves champion stopped Ely Dodge in the third frame. The Brown Bombers, coached by Fritz Pollard, former all-American football star from Brown university make their Harlem debut at Dyckman Oval Sunday... They defeated the Fairfield Tigers 6 to 0 last Sunday. Dixie Matthews, Al Harris, Freddie Rogers, Joe Lillard and Otis Troupe are figured in the line up. The members of Tuckee's track team, dominated the women's A. A. U. track meet held at Trenton, N. J. last week. Cora Gaines won the 80 meter hurdles and then jumped 4 feet, 10 1/2 inches to place second in the high jump... Lula Hynes was runner up for high honors when she placed first in the broad jump (17 feet, 8 1/2 inches) and then took second in the 50 meter dash... Mabel Smith placed second in the broad jump and then finished fourth in the 200 meter dash. Florence N. Wright placed second both in the shot put and in the discus throw... Melissa Fitzpatrick placed second in the baseball throw and Jessie Abbott took fourth in the 100 meter dash. In the second series of games between the San Domingo Champs with Satchel Paige at the helm the Negro National League Stars with Johnny Taylor coming to the hurling in the first game, came to an even break... The San Domingos took the first game 9 to 4, while Negro Stars won the final game 1 to 0 at the end of five innings when the game was called on account of darkness. Bill Holland and Mackey were the batteries for the Stars, while Chet Brewer was on the mound for the San Domingos with Perkins doing the catching. Football Glimmers:— Lincoln university's team defeated the Vagabond A. C., 22 to 6 in a tune up game... Knoxville barely nosed out the local alumni team 6 to 0... Both Wiley and Prairie View won their opening sessions. Wiley stopped Jarvis college 20 to 0 and Prairie View swamped Sam Houston to a 46 to 0 tune... Hampton's Pirates play the Virginia State Trojans Saturday... Virginia Union faces Morgan in a night game at Baltimore. There is a threatening shake-up in the New York Boxing Commission. Several persons charging that the 20th Century Sporting Club, the organization that promotes all of Joe Louis' fights, has been receiving the breaks from this body. Joe Louis incidentally, is to turn actor. He has just signed to make six pictures. One will be a history of

his life. Louis is following the foot steps of Jack Dempsey, Gene Tunney and Max Baer all of whom appeared in at least one film.

Pete Sarron, the NBA feather weight champion arrived from Paris Friday night on the Ile de France. Sarron is scheduled to meet Henry Armstrong for the title at Madison Square Garden on Oct. 20th... Tommy Farr has signed an exclusive contract with Mike Jacobs. The contract is scheduled to run for five years. Farr left for England last week but will return for a February bout.

In London last week, Larry Gaines knocked out Charles Rutz, heavyweight champion of France. The end came in the first round. Other fight results of last week include: Tiger Fox and Yustin Sirutis fought a ten round draw at the Rockland Palace... Jimmy Clark, Jamestown, New York, knocked out Tommy Bland of Toronto in the first round.

There will be several changes in the Negro National League next year. Several of the players and managers are disgruntled at the way Gus Greenlee has been handling the business. They feel that the players who deserted the league to accept high salaries should have been dealt with severely. Instead, they were allowed to participate in games against National League players and evidently white washed.

Jerome "Bud" Holland, Cornell's football end, is a name to be con-jured with in collegiate circles. Holland is rated as the most dangerous man on the team that looms as the best in the country to date. Against Colgate, he scored three touchdowns, two on end plays and one on a forward pass. Negro History

J. A. Rogers, well known author and 1845 Seventh avenue, New York City, has begun publication of a bulletin, known as "Gems of Negro History" which will appear weekly. It is 10 x 14 and illustrated.

Among its features will be a continuous story of the Negro from the dawn of time to the present in all the various lands as ancient India, Babylonia, Egypt, Greece, Rome, Africa and the countries of the New World. The history of the Afro-American from his first arrival in 1513 to the present in the various states will also be told continuously.

The influence of the Negro on the white race will be shown by citing each week a noted white person and his or her contact with some Negro, great or small. One living Negro who has made or is making history will be given, and also one amazing fact of Negro history.

The first issue contains the picture and the story of Isabeau, a black slave girl, who rose to be the Josephine Baker of France in the 1770's and was favorite of a King of France. Facts and a sketch shows the arrival of a Negro of fier with Ponce de Leon, the first white man to touch what is now the United States. There is also a sketch of Dr. Emmett Scott, noted educator of Howard university, and a believe it or not showing the part the Negro played in the handling of fine gold and diamonds from time immemorial, a method still in use. All is beautifully illustrated by C. C. Bailey, one of the most gifted of our younger Negro artists.

Says Southern Women Keep Rift Open

Madison, Wis., Oct. 7 (ANP)—Last week at ceremonies here held in honor of Confederate soldiers who died at Camp Randall prison camp, Edward H. Cowan of Crafordville, Ind., G. A. R. Surgeon General, blamed the Daughters of the Confederacy for continuing a North and South division, declared "The men in the South have been our friends since the Civil War ended, but the women keep alive our differences."

General Cowan praised the speech of C. H. William Ruhe of Pittsburgh, Pa., G. A. R. national commander, who said, "When the contest (Civil War) was over the strife subsided, and surrender made the oath of allegiance supporting the Constitution and the flag of the United States was given. For that reason, it is my wish that over the graves of these Confederate soldiers be floated the flag of the United States...not in a spirit of animosity but of reciprocity."
