Kid North Takes Stable to Seattle

San Mateo, Calif., Oct. 28 (ANP)—Robert "Kid" North, famous at the turn of the century as the trainer of Joe Gans, former lightweight champion pugilist of the world and in later days as the trainer of thoroughbred horses—is planning to take his charges in the Meadow-Kozinsky stable to Seattle for the Longacres meeting, it was learned here this week.

Kid North is manager of the Meadowbrook stable and stock farm and ranks as the outstanding Negro trainer of the day. He is well known to Hollywood's movie colony, had entries at Bing Crosby's Del Mar Racetrack meeting this last summer, was photographed with Crosby and Andy Devine at Del Mar on the opening day of the July meeting.

Recently Kid North took first call on the riding services of the famed Jockey Ralph Neves of South City, considered one of the greatest of present day jockeys, but who, because of his impetuosity and quick temper while in the saddle, has been repeatedly disqualified by track officials. North is convinced that he can get Neves to overcome this handicap and thereby become one of the ace riders of the Meadowbrook stable.

Among the prize winners under North's supervision, with Charley Groose as assistant trainer, are Better Bet, Cue Ball, Hunting Ridge, Cue Ball, Sharp Girl (winner of the Lassie Stakes), Sweeping Flame and Saratoga Gal. North recently swapped Bon Red for Saratoga Gal, thought first "he had something there," later changed his mind, decided it was an even swap—as both parties to the transaction got exactly nothing.

As a souvenir of the days "Way back when" he trained Champion Joe Gans, Kid North has lately come into possession of the punching bag used by Gans in 1902 while training for the fight with Frank Ernie at Fort Erie, and also one of the gloves Gans used in the historic championship battle of July 4, 1908, at San Francisco when he lost the world's lightweight title to the tough ring gladiator, Battling Nelson of Chicago. These trophies, are among Kid North's prized possessions.

Morgan Coach Says Mathematics Help Him Get Winners

Baltimore, Oct. 28 (ANP)—If you want to know the secret of the phenomenal success attending Morgan college's football team—it hasn't been defeated in 44 games extending through 6 years—then you need look no farther than the field of mathematics.

Coach Edward P. Hurt, normally a mathematics professor, has carried the precision of his science to the gridiron. "It's all a matter of timing," he declared. "In science you won't be satisfied with anything less than exactness. You need the same exactness in coaching a football team."

Accordingly, all his plays are diagrammed and worked out with mathematical precision. Each player has to complete a fraction of the whole play and taught to do exactly that. The result is a ground gaining maneuver—such as his "round Robin" which was first introduced to a bewildered Bluefield eleven in 1935.

In this play, the oval was snapped to the fullback, who threw a forward pass to a halfback, who lateraled it to the other half, who then lateraled it back to the fullback who had come wide around end. The first time it was tried it was good for a touchdown as the dazed opponents stared open mouthed. These and similar plays have helped Morgan to amass a total of 983 points in six years to the opponents' 82.

Arrest Man in Dixie As "Spitting Artist"

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 28 (ANP)—Raleigh police last Tuesday arrested Charlie White of Method, N. C., as the long sought "spitting artist," alleged to have a new and novel method of pick pockets. S. C. Abolishes Admissions To Athletic Contests

Talladega, Ala., Oct. 28 (ANP)—In order to renounce "commercialism in athletic," Talladega college is inaugurating a policy of no admission charges to this year's football games and other sporting contests, it was announced Monday by President Gallagher.

Commenting upon this departure from custom, the president stated, "This step is a definite renunciation of all commercialism in athletics. For many years the college has followed the consistent policy of refusing to give athletic scholarships or to offer any kind of special inducement solely to attract athletes and build up winning teams. The elimination of gate receipts marks the logical culmination of this policy."

It is understood that the only other institution in the country following a similar policy is John Hopkins university, white, of Maryland.
