Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 11 (ANP)—The County Poor House, long the bogle of the aged and destitute, may be eliminated in the future, if the program sponsored by the State Department of Public Welfare is pushed to a successful conclusion. The Department seek the ultimate elimination of county homes through substitution of Social Security benefits, home comforts and institutional care, according to the welfare commissioner, Mrs. W. T. Bost.

Mrs. Bost pointed out this week that the State of Alabama, by giving old people the advantages of Social Security and by consolidating welfare activities, has been able to reduce the number of county homes from 62 to 26, a decrease of more than half in one year.

The Christian Ministry

"A sermon is a message plus a message plus a life." This every minister should know. Sinners use the false hiring preacher as an instrument of criticism. Much they say about them is true. It is too bad that the ministry as a whole must suffer embarrassment because of impostors. But this does not excuse anyone for their sins. Though during ancient times often, the majority of Israel's and Judah's prophets left God there was always "one man of God" such as Elijah. Like Jeremiah, we ask "can God find a man?"

To anyone who feels that he can get along without a preacher let him answer these questions: "How shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach except they be sent?"
