#### Sale of Christmas Seals Under Way

With the opening of the thirty-first annual Christmas Seal campaign throughout the state, residents of every Nebraska community are asked to continue the fight against tuberculosis.

"During the last year tuberculosis claimed the lives of 253 Nebraskans, as against 306 for the previous year and indicates that the Nebraska Tuberculosis association's efforts toward eradication of the disease is making headway.

"We realize as we never have before that if we are to save the valuable young lives in our Nebraska communities, we must begin our search early and arrest the beginning cases before they have time to develop," Dr. John F. Allen, president of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association, stated.

If this is to be done the program on prevention cannot be allowed to lag. Health education must be continued so the Nebraskans will know how to guard themselves against tuberculosis. The association recognizes the importance of both as well as the necessity of taking care of tuberculosis patients.

Rural school children are again participating in this year's Christmas Seal Sale by serving as "messengers" in distributing the Seals.

Residents of Nebraska are urged to buy them generously and use them freely, thus participating in spreading their message of health and cheer, which says to the world that tuberculosis is preventable and that it is curable.

The entire program of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association is financed by the sale of Christmas Seals. Fifty per cent of the proceeds raised in each community is returned to that community for health work.

### Ask Senators To Support Anti-Lynch Bill in This Session

At a mass meeting Sunday afternoon sponsored by the National Negro Congress Council of Omaha, at the Zion Baptist church, a huge gathering of black Americans and fair minded white Americans, representing 6,000 Omaha voters, attached their signature to a resolution prepared by Senator John Adams, jr. The resolution as prepared were as follows:

Whereas, there have been over 5000 lynchings in the U. S. A. since 1886,

Whereas lynching is in violation of the fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution,

Whereas lynching is inhuman, barbaric, and uncivilized,

Whereas lynching is a dark cloud upon the American Nation,

Whereas the Anti-Lynch bill has passed the House of Representatives, and whereas the U. S. Senate is now considering the same,

It is therefore resolved by the Omaha Council of the National Negro Congress, in a meeting at the Zion Baptist church, Omaha, Neb., at 8:30 p. m., on the 21st day of November, that Senator Burke and Senator Norris, the Honorable Senators from the state of Nebraska, be requested to vote for and to use their best efforts to secure the passage of the Anti-Lynch bill now in the Senate.

Mr. Matthews has indeed had a colorful and exciting career since having been appointed to the police department, December 29th, 1933, on a 6-month probation.

Two years following his appointment on the night of January 20, 1925, he was shot while in the line of duty by an unknown assailant. On September 1, 1923, Mr. Matthews resigned from the police department and went into the restaurant business for himself, however, at the termination of five months the urge for law enforcement was so great that Mr. Matthews returned back to the force February 1, 1926.

Mr. Matthews proved to be such an efficient officer that his superiors deemed it advisable to promote him to the rank of detective November 1, 1937. In the light of Mr. Matthews, courage and efficient record as a patrolman we are sure that the wisdom of his superiors will be justified in promoting him to the rank of detective. 
