Our host served a delicious Dutch lunch. A pleasant time was had by all. Myrtle Robinson, Reporter.

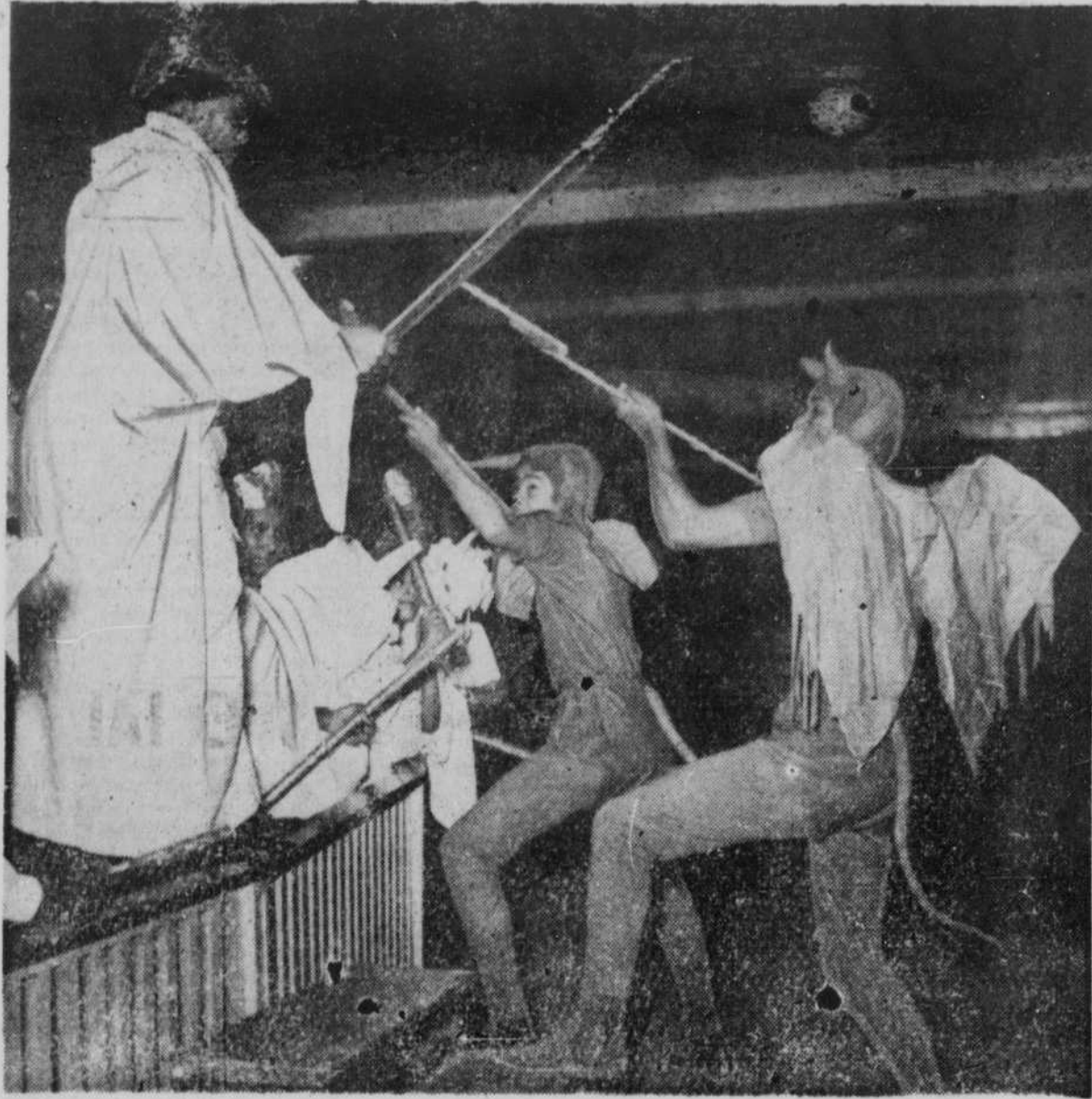

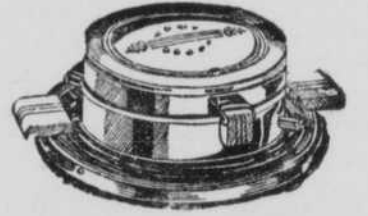

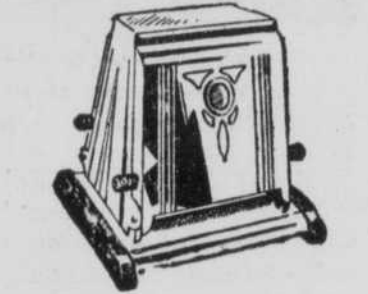
