Los Angeles, Dec. 23 (By Harry Levette for ANP)—Accusing police authorities of attempting to intimidate her or jail her for perjury before the Rev. Harold Wilson could be placed on trial, Mrs. Beatrice Reeves, prominent in social and political circles, declares that she was called before the grand jury twice last week. She was also called before the District attorney's investigation committee she declares.

Although the much discussed case in which Wilson is charged with five sex complaints was set for last Thursday before Judge Judge Valentine in Department 46, it was Friday before a jury could be impaneled. This difficulty Mrs. Reeves also charges to the prosecution which she gave is prompted by political entanglements to avoid prosecution of Wilson, who at the time was boy's director of the 28th Street YMCA is alleged to have committed a number of offenses against Bertrand Hunter, age 10.

Mrs. Reeves stated that since the commission of the crimes

against the Hunter boy, Wilson has been ordained as minister of the A. M. E. church and sent to a church in Calexico, where he was eventually arrested.

Last week Mrs. Reeves stated to the press that since the arrest she has been threatened a number of times over the telephone. She was told, she said that she was "putting her neck out too far in the Wilson case" and to get out of it if she wanted "to stay healthy." Unable to frighten her with threats of violence, she stated, she had been approached with the offer of a bribe of \$500.

Reporting the threats to Mayor Shaw, Mrs. Reeves declares she was told that she was "crazy" and there was nothing to worry or be some alarmed about.
