A WORKING GIRL'S SHORT CUT TO BEAUTY

So much has been said about the girl with leisure, how she may keep her figure trim by daily walks and exercise at odd hours, prolonged facial treatments to keep her skin soft and her pores small, how she may soak her finger nails in warm oil to prevent brittleness, and a thousand methods to keep her looking rested and glamorous for that occasion of occasions, a dinner engagement with the man of the moment.

But the working girl, Heaven help her, is completely overlooked in this beauty schedule. She, who spends her day earning a living, grinding soot and grime into her pores and cracking her fingernails, has perhaps an hour at the most between the time when she gets home, feeling as though she had been through a wringer, and the big moment when she must set forth again. But she is expected to look her freshest and feel her gayest!

Rest and Bath Helpful

There is a short cut for her. The first and most important step upon arriving home after a wearing day is a warm, restful bath. Relax, lie back in the tub and think pleasant, peaceful thoughts for as long as possible. Cover your face with a substantial coating of cold cream;

give the cream plenty of time to sink into the skin and rout all particles of dust and soot, and then remove thoroughly, being sure always to rub upward and outward with the cloth or tissue you are using. Carefully sponge off your face with a pad of cotton, dipped in a skin tonic—witch hazel will do—to remove all traces of cold cream and stimulate the skin to a healthy glow. Then take two pads of cotton, dipped in the same astringent, and place them over your eyes. If possible, lie down in a darkened room for ten or fifteen minutes with the pads over your eyes. You will rise with brighter and clearer eyes and feeling generally rested.

Powder Shouldn't Be Noticed

And now for the final steps—the application of your makeup. Powder, properly applied, should never be noticeable. So much has been said about lipstick that I shall add only this: be sure that your lipstick covers the inside as well as the outside edges of your mouth. I am assuming that your nail polish is intact. If not, wipe it all off. Better no lustre at all, than peeling, blotchy looking polish. Now a touch of perfume behind each ear, used very, very sparingly, and you are ready to go out and compete with the best of your idle sisters. Good luck to you!
