be fair to Negro workers is also on the list of the association's objectives.

Elimination of coor bars in the Army and Navy is another objective of the NAACP which is being pressed especially in view of the agitation for huge military and naval appropriation bills.

The association is also active in plans to attack the widespread and practically iron-clad discrimination against the Negro in the federal civil service and in this connection has registered its objection to the pending government reorganization bill which would abolish the three-man civil service commission and substitute a single director therefor.

"Negro Americans are faced with a hard battle on many fronts if they are to secure the rights due them as citizens," said Walter White, NAACP secretary. "We have known this all along but the filibuster against the anti-lynching bill brought it sharply to the front and drove home to every Negro and liberal friend of the race the necessity for a wide battle for the rights of the race. We must have the ballot. We must have equal opportunities in education. We must have employment with no discriminatory wage rates. We must be admitted to the civil service on merit and not barred on account of color. We must have an opportunity to serve our country in every branch of the military and naval services without being insulted and discriminated against."

"These things are plainly indicated by the vicious and slanderous filibuster in the Senate. The NAACP is now at work organizing and educating the public in the hundred and thousands of home communities for the struggle which must be made for our rights. At our Twenty-ninth annual conference in Columbus, Ohio, June 28 to July 3, we expect to launch a nationwide struggle which will not be denied."
