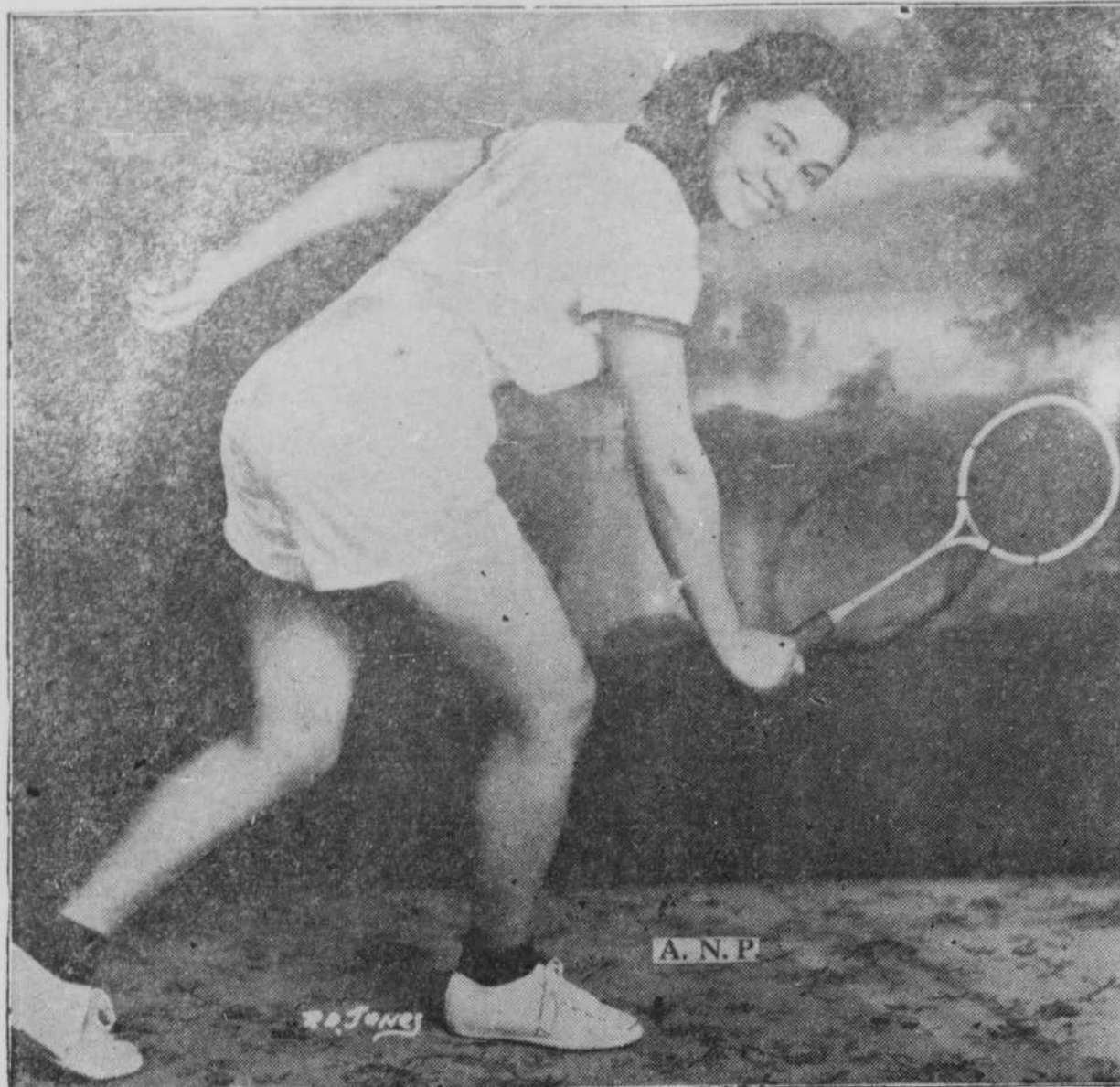

Colored Woman Member Ill. State

Springfield, Ill., May 21 (ANP)—For the first time in the history of the all important Republican State Central committee, a woman sat in on the deliberations of that body. She was Mrs. Cornelia J. Pickett, a colored woman elected in the April primary from the First Congressional District of Illinois. Long before time to cast ballots for the election of officers, Mrs. Pickett was much in demand.

It is this committee which names and forms the policies for state candidates and state campaigns. The fact that Mrs. Pickett, the only colored person on this committee will cause her to be in demand throughout the state and her influence in state affairs.

Mrs. Pickett also was the first colored woman to be elected as an alternate delegate to the Republican National Convention from the state of Illinois. She is a protégé of State Senator William E. King, having started her political career under him about twelve years ago.

Cleveland Dentist Y's YMCA Secretary for Patronizing White

Cleveland, May 21 (ANP)—Because his wife Mrs. Della S. Frye patronized white dentists to the exclusion of her own group, Capt. Charles Frye, executive secretary of the Cedar branch YMCA has informed the board of the board of the Cedar branch YMCA, which has not at the YMCA for two years. Staring Soy Beans

Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri and North Carolina are big soy bean states with thirty three and a half million bushels, twice the crop of last year. Since the general crop is plentiful so many farmers this year cut their soy beans for hay but rather than threshing for the beans. Where soy beans are thoroughly dry there is little danger from heating. Few insects attack them. When stored in 50 degree seed with high moisture content showed little evidence of loss in viability after a year. High temperature and high moisture content cause storage loss, but this loss need be occasioned if the beans are dry when threshed.

Educators Asks Aid

Washington, D. C., May 21 A. N. P.)—The National Conference on Federal Aid to Education last week heard Mordcai Johnson, president of Howard University, John P. Davis, secretary of the National Negro Congress, and Dr. Frank P. Graham, president of the University of North Carolina, unite in urging that the Federal government furnish grants to aid education in the States and reduce the inequalities prevailing against Negro schools. The Conference was sponsored jointly by the Progressive Education and the American Federation of Teachers.

Alvin three spoke in support of the Harrison-Fletcher and Thomas bill for federal aid to education. The bill appropriates amounts starting at \$72,000,000 in 1939-40 and increasing to \$292,000,000 in 1944-45, the money to be distributed among the states with the poorest sources. The bill carries a provision that in states supporting a white and a Negro system of school the funds must be equitably shared, soon realized the need of the natives for medical attention, so he returned to America, divided between the two.

The bills embody in legislative form the recommendations of President Roosevelt's Advisory Committee on Education.

"I am strongly in favor of Federal Aid to Education in the States," declared Dr. Johnson, "careful review of the National Advisory Committee on Education, both in the Hoover and the Roosevelt administrations have shown beyond reasonable doubt that widespread inequalities exist in the United States. In general, the states in the South are working on a basis of a per capita expenditure far below the average for the United States.

"The Negro population is at the greatest disadvantage in the entire country. For even in those states where the per capita expenditure is below \$45 per child, the Negro child on the average receives only \$15 worth of attention.
