The President asks all members and friends to come out and enjoy themselves.

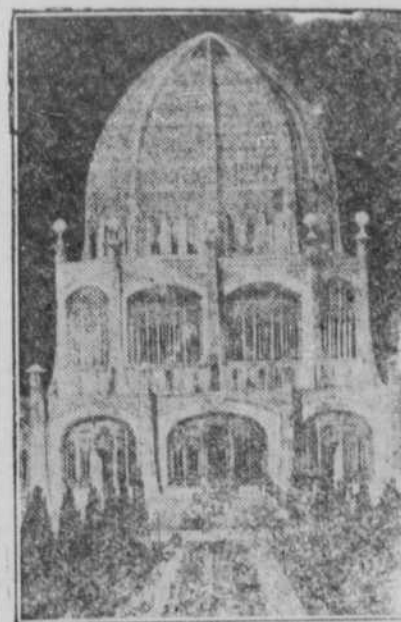
