Very Well Attended

The second annual May Day Festival of Junior Choirs from 12 different churches of Omaha attracted an overflow audience of two thousand people to Zion Baptist church Sunday afternoon.

About four hundred young singers participated.

Climaxing the program was the crowning of Miss Cecile Walls of Bethel Baptist church, South Omaha, as May Queen.

The coveted crown being placed upon the brow of the new queen by the illustrious outgoing queen of 1937 Miss Priscilla Gilden, who also was a representative of Bethel Baptist.

Selection of the queen depends on the results of a financial drive carried on by each respective church entering a queen, with the sponsors of same making report in cash to the finance committee after which all money collected through such a drive is turned back to the respective churches.

Excitement grew as Festival Chairman S. Edward Gilbert announced the church by church starting at \$4 and reaching a top of \$297.91 for Bethel. A grand total of \$385.91 was added to the coffers of the Omaha churches participating.

Runners-up queens were Joyce Lucky, St. John's A. M. E.; Lena Paez, Zion Baptist; Connie Cuffens, Metropolitan; Ollie Whidby, Pleasant Green; Gerline Smith, Clair Chapel, and Velma Thomas, Pilgrim Baptist.

The program was preceded by a mammoth parade of youths through the streets led by the Omaha Concert band under the direction of Mr. George Bryant, this wonderful array of musicians attired in their blue and white were obtained through the courtesy of the Federal music project of which Mr. William Meyers is state director.

Musical features of the program were under the directions of Miss Ethel Jones.

Speak at Boys Town

W. M. Jeffers, president of the Union Pacific railroad, will be the speaker at Commencement Exercises for the second graduating class of the Boys Town high school.

Father Flanagan will give out diplomas to the nine members of the graduating class. Graduates are Leo Kuhn, Martin O'Dea, James Feehan, Stanley Lacy, Paul Chasteen, T. McGuire, Linford Johnson, and Henry Nicholas, and they come from six states.

This is the second class to graduate from the high school at Boys Town, which was fully accredited two years ago. One graduate, Martin O'Dea, plans to attend the Creighton Medical School next semester. Father Flanagan is trying to find jobs for the others.

NAAACP to Meet

Columbus, O., May 28—Mrs. Henrietta McGhee, a widow, who has taken part in the struggles of the sharecropper in eastern Arkansas, is to be one of the speakers at the twenty-ninth annual conference of the NAAACP here Wednesday, June 29.

Mrs. McGhee was arrested at the point of revolvers and shotguns simply because she asked a plantation owner for a dollar a hundred pounds for picking cotton. For this she was charged with "enticing labor" under an old Arkansas law. She was jailed and beaten by officers and finally released on bail after action through the Southern Tenant Farmers Union. Mrs. McGhee tells a tragic story of the struggles of black and white sharecroppers to get a living wage for their labor.

Other speakers on the program with her will be Dr. Charles H. Wesley, of Howard university, who will speak on the Negro worker and the labor movement; and Dr. T. V. Smith, of the University of Chicago, who will outline the relation of American Negroes as a working class population to the new political alignments.

Recreation

Attendance at the city recreation centers mounted from 10,000 to 20,194 this past week according to Wm. Meyers, recreation director who expressed pleasure at the rapidly increasing interest the public is taking in the project.

The Florence Boys Senior soft ball league has been organized with eight teams, four of which went into action Friday May 20.

A very successful picnic attended by 156 people was held at Elmwood park Tuesday May 19. The pleasure party was sponsored by the district school, 86th and Maple streets. Paul MacCrone and "Sonny" (Brookhaus) of the Party Service department of the city recreation project were responsible for the games, etc., at this enjoyable affair.

The Hobby Show held last week at the YMCA was a revelation in patience and ingenuity and a lesson in the profitable and pleasant employment of leisure time. Many of the exhibits suggested a touch of genius in their conception and execution. The city recreation project's display provoked much admiration and enthusiastic comment. Many of the objects in the collection showed marked talent, creative ability and imagination on the part of the exhibitors, all of whom are Works Progress Administration city recreation project workers.
