Champaign, Ill., May 28 By Regional Fisher for ANP—Edward Ferguson, jr., who already has his bachelor's and master's degrees from Illinois university, has just completed his residence requirements for a Ph. D. in zoology after earning added laurels during the current year.

He was elected to Phi Sigma, honorary biological research society this year. While working on his M. S. in 1933, he was elected to Sigma Xi, honorary research society. Mr. Ferguson on a General Education Board fellowship in 1937-38, has completed his marine biological laboratory experience, has passed foreign language and preliminary examinations and this year maintained an "A" average. Because of the excellence of his work, he will be permitted to return in September to the faculty of Southern university and there complete the rest of his study for his doctorate.

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Woman Legislator, 71 Travels In Campaign

Mrs. Black knows personally 1,500 of 1,805 voters in Yukon territory. Among all the women legislators in the world, the laurels for the most strenuous election campaigning probably should go to adventurous seventy-one-year-old Mrs. Martha Louise Black who represents Canada's northernmost Yukon Territory, in the house of commons.

Scattered throughout this vast hinterland there are only 1,805 voters, yet, Mrs. Blacks knows 1,400. In her last campaign she traveled thousands of miles by canoes, motorboats, a river steamer and two horse teams and visited nearly all of them. When other means of transportation were impracticable, she walked, making a three-mile trek through the forest to visit three trappers. When the ballots were counted she had a majority of 135.

Mrs. Black is no novice at parliamentary duties. Her husband was elected as a member of the Yukon in 1921 and in 1930 became speaker of the house of commons. Ill health caused him to give up parliamentary duties in 1935 and Mrs. Black stepped into the breach. After a stern fight she won although the conservative party lost the election. Mrs. Black was born and educated in Chicago and married there in 1917.

With Purdy and their two sons she climbed the Chiloote Pass in 1898 to hunt for gold in the Yukon and in a lonely cabin when her husband was out prospecting, she bore her third son, Lyman, killed this year in an automobile accident. In 1900 word reached her in her log cabin that her husband had died while on a trip to Honolulu. Left alone with her three children she formed a claim partnership with two men to work a gold field.

While 16 men worked to wash gold nuggets from the stream bed, the widow cooked for them. The following year she erected a sawmill, and for three years she ran that business. Then she met a young lawyer, George Black. In 1904 they were married.

Seven years later, Mrs. Black became the First Lady of the Yukon with the appointment of her husband as commissioner.

When the World War started, Black enlisted with her two stepsons. Not to be left behind, Mrs. Black went along as the only woman on the troop-ship, leaving for England.

While her husband and sons fought in France, Mrs. Black nursed the wounded who came back to England for which she was made a Fellow of the Royal Geographical society. On their return to Canada, Black decided to run for parliament. Mrs. Black resumed her hobby of collecting wild flowers, in the Yukon and in 1934 and 1935 sent most of her specimens to the Wembley exhibition in London. Now she has more than 600 specimen of Yukon flowers. Her garden in Dawson City is the best known in the far north.

CIO Leads Fight On Ohio Aid Denial

Cleveland, May 25 (CNA)—While 300 sit-in strikers took possession of Cleveland's City Council Chamber both Labor Non-Partisan League and the CIO mobilized forces this week to demand a quick solution to the national scandal of Cleveland's relief breakdown.

The sit-down started when, with all relief exhausted for the third time in two weeks, 1,000 relief clients and CIO unionists won a meagre appropriation of \$80,000 to feed the 70,000 Negro and white relief clients here during the present week.

Outside the relief stations thousands of tense parents and famished children gather to demand adequate relief.

In the meantime labor leaders charged that "Governor L. Davey, big business lobbyists and rural legislators whom they control," had effectively delayed any genuine solution to the problem. The huge relief population continued to eke out an existence on rations averaging 6 and one half cents per meal—a standard admittedly creating slow starvation and forming a basis for illness which won't become noticeable for weeks, according to health authorities.
