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Have You Got Your Social Security Number?

Lincoln, Nebraska, June 23—Many Nebraska wage earners who are eligible for unemployment compensation benefits, when they become payable under the Nebraska law after January 1, 1939 may find difficulty in proving their claims due to lack of a Social Security account number, it was pointed out in a statement issued by R. T. Malone, director of the Nebraska Unemployment Compensation Division, Cooperation of employers in reporting correct records for each employee has been asked to assure prompt payment of benefit claims.

"In checking over workers' reports filed with the division by employers of eight or more workers, who are therefore subject to the law, we find that many eligible Nebraska workers have failed either to apply for their Social Security account number or have lost the number after it was issued," said Malone. "Between 5,000 and 7,000 errors have been found in workers' wage reports, which must be corrected."

When the original Social Security number is lost, the worker should notify his employer and immediately secure a duplicate and not a new number from the nearest Social Security Board field office.

Cape Town, S. Africa, June 24 (ANP)—Last week, while addressing a crowded meeting at Wynberg Town Hall, General Jan Smuts made an appeal for justice and declaring they were a minority in this country and should not be discriminated against or treated as if they were monkeys or baboons.
