RACE WPA. ACTORS IN HARLEM NOT DROPPED FROM ROLLS

New York, July 14, (C) —A statement from the Federal Theatre has cleared up rumors that Negro actors were being "liquidated" in the organization, following announcement of clos-

ing the Lafayette WPA theatre in Harlem on June 28. George Kondolf, director of the project for New York, says the Lafayette has been closed "for purposes of economy and efficiency", but that "the most varied and interesting program ever contemplated for the Federal Theatre's Negro personnel" is in the making. "Haiti", the Harlem WPA play, reopens at the 63rd Street Music Hall on Broadway, on July 11.
