The findings from these studies show "startling results due to the continual stimulation of reading to the child at a very early age by the mother." Greatest' effect is produced on the intelligence level e fthe child by reading between the ages of two to seven.

The Omaha psychologist reports the most marked effect of this early training upon the child's facility in the language arts: literature, history and civics, geography and arithmetic computation.


