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

FROM DOUGLAS COUNTY DEMOCRATIC HEADQUARTERS

Douglas County's Democratic organization went into high gear this week, starting action in the campaign with a series of radio broadcasts and concentration by party workers on registering of all unregistered Democratic voters. County Chairman Edward J. Dugan, pleased with a three-to-one showing by Democrats in the early registration, confidently predicted a margin of 40,000 Democratic registration in the county this year.

Democratic County candidates are working through county headquarters, 1816 Douglas St. on a united front campaign for the straight Democratic ticket. State candidates also are using the county headquarters for their activities in Douglas County.

Chairman Dugan and the three Democratic candidates for County Commissioner promptly rejected an attempt by Republican County Commissioner candidates to inject a County Manager issue into the county campaign. The Democratic candidates take the stand that since they will have no votes on adoption of the County Manager plan, they should devote themselves to their economy platform pledges rather than taking up other matters in the campaign.

Chairman Dugan issued a denial to criticism that some party workers were not carrying out headquarters instructions regarding the manner of listing unregistered voters.

"There have been no complaints to headquarters regarding misrepresentations by any of the workers," he said. "We want full registration for all Democrats by fair methods. It is not my desire, nor ever has been, to elect the Democratic ticket by deception or misrepresentation."

The straight Democratic ticket, congressional, state, and county has been endorsed by the Douglas County Union Voters League, representing political activities of organized labor. Another early endorsement of the whole ticket is from the Austrian-Hungarian Verein.
