Christian Literature

A person is not only judged by the company he keeps, but he is also judged by what he feeds his mind upon. Next to the radio, the press is the greatest scourge of propaganda. Every doctrine or theory seems to realize the value of the printed page. Communism, Nazism, Pac'ism Christianity and all "isms" try to impress and sway the masses by spreading literature.

The month of November is being observed as "Literature Month" by the Gospel Trumpet Press and the church of God. Special emphasis is being placed upon (a) the reading of good Christian books, (b) the church paper (c) the distribution of pamphlets. These are to carry the message of the gospels of Christ and its power to save

from sin when applied by faith.

Most of the popular readers spend their time reading fiction and many times it is the cheaper sort. There is no unfavorable criticism to be passed on the reading of fiction, when it is clean and practical. One cannot live a well rounded physical life, if he eats only starches, or fats or vegetables alone. There should be a well rounded diet and a balanced ration.

Since this is true physically, it is also true with the mind. We must not read all of one kind of reading matter i. e. only fiction, etc. But to be intelligent, we must have an accurate knowledge of biography, science fiction (clean and practical) and religion. Since Christ is, or should be the center of all our lives, then Christian literature is the best means of spreading the truth about him.

Re-Elect JOHN ADAMS, Jr To State Legislature

Favors old age pensions; opposes new taxes; seeks more adequate administration of relief; 1937 Session introduced and sponsored all Housing Legislation for Nebraska; led fight for full cent of gas tax appropriated to relief and state assistance; sought distribution of relief on basis of need, not population; supported Omaha Police and Firemen bills; sponsored bill authorizing creation of dock boards; voted for L. B. 112, prohibiting religious questions on applications for teachers' positions in Nebraska; sponsored unemployment insurance bill.

Mr. Adams is a graduate of the University of Nebraska in 1929 with Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Law Degrees. Since then he has practiced law in Omaha and has become very well known as an attorney. He has served two terms in the Legislature. He has been endorsed by Labor.

H. A. Gray, Director of Housing of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, Washington, D. C., in a letter to John Adams, Jr., dated May 24, 1937, in speaking of the Housing Legislation introduced by Mr. Adams, stated: "I think that you may justly be proud of your successful efforts on behalf of legislation designed to meet one of the most urgent social problems confronting us today." Mr. Adams states:

"I wish to take this opportunity to thank all of my friends who supported me in my last campaign. I have always had the desire to be of some service to my community, city and state. For this reason I desire to continue as your State Representative. I will sincerely appreciate your vote."


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
