

SENATOR BURKE TO SPEAK AT OMAHA U.

United States Senator Edward R. Burke of Nebraska will be one of the main speakers at a conference on "Education as a Protection against False Propaganda in a Democracy" during University of Omaha dedication exercises, Nov. 3 to 5, President Rowland Haynes announced today.

Senator Burke's topic at the conference will be "Write Your Congressman or Senator."

The conference will open the three-day ceremony's Thursday evening, November 3 at 8 P.M. All conferences and the dedicatory are open to the public.

Mr. Carroll Binder, foreign editor of the Chicago Daily News will be the other principal speaker at this conference. Binder formerly was a foreign correspondent in London, Russia and Italy and has traveled in Japan, Manchukuo, and Latin America as well as throughout Europe. He will address the conference on "The United States in a War-Minded World."

The conference on propaganda will be followed Friday by another on "Student Guidance on the College Level." Friday evening formal dedication services will be held in the University auditorium, with President Philip C. Nash of the University of Toledo delivering the main address.

Representatives from nearly a hundred other universities and colleges will attend the dedication program. Among the institutions naming delegates are Boston university, Bucknell university, Cath-

olic university of America, Columbia university, Colorado college, Connecticut State college, Creighton, Drake university, Drexel Institute of Technology, Duchesne college, George Washington university, Grinnell college, Harvard university, Iowa State college, Kansas State college, Knox college, Lindenwood college, Massachusetts State college, North Dakota Agricultural college, North Texas S. Teachers college, Northwestern Missouri State Teachers college, Ohio university, Ohio Wesleyan.

Y., William Jewell college, Yankton college, and others.

Institution unable to send delegates have sent congratulations to the University of Omaha on its dedication.

Dedication ceremonies will come to an end with the concluding part of the student guidance conference Saturday morning.

Including roads in suburban additions, surfaced through WPA projects in the past three years, the total for the Douglas road system exceeds 800 miles.

In thickly populated Douglas county these highways carry heavier traffic and provide greater community service than roads in less populous Nebraska areas. It is important to every farmer, to every Omahan and to every resident of every town in the county that this road service be effective. Satisfactory results require that the roads be maintained at the highest standard possible within the limits of reasonable expenditures.

C. A. Sorensen

Negroes will vote for C. A. Sorensen for the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. Why? Because they remember him and his heroic act during the North Platte race riot. Just a reminder for those who may not recall the North Platte riot.

When Honorable C. A. Sorensen was attorney general for the State of Nebraska, the underworld element of North Platte had a difference that caused their trouble to spread over the entire city and ended in a race riot.

Early one Sunday morning the writer of this article, C. C. Galloway, was called by a railroad employee and was told that Negro homes were being burned down, household effects destroyed and Negro citizens being driven out of North Platte.

On receiving this information I immediately called the North Platte chief of police and asked for facts in the matter. I was told by the answering party that by night not a Negro would be left in North Platte. and that the riot was beyond the control of the local officials and nothing in their power could they do to keep the Negroes from being run out of town.

I immediately put in a call for Governor Weaver of Lincoln and was told by Mrs. Weaver that he was out of the city, but that she

would get in touch with him and have him call me immediately. I then proceeded to get in touch with the attorney general with whom I had had a pleasant acquaintance for some years, the Honorable C. A. Sorensen. I placed a call for Mr. C. A. Sorensen. I was successful in contacting him at once. I told Mr. Sorensen of racial trouble in North Platte. I told him in detail my conversation with the local authorities. Mr. Sorensen assured me that he would immediately get in touch with the situation and do everything within his power to bring about law and order. Immediately Mr. Sorensen detailed his entire forces to take action. A deputy from his office was sent to North Platte to handle the matter under Mr. Sorensen's instructions. Mr. Sorensen found that Negroes were being driven out of town, their homes set on fire and furniture thrown out into the street. Mr. Sorensen maintained a Deputy general in the city of North Platte until every Negro that was mistreated was compensated, homes repaired and furniture put back into condition and law and order restored.

Today three of the men responsible for the instigation of this trouble are serving long terms in the state penitentiary.

At the polls the Negro should consider a candidate's record, especially those that have had an opportunity to make a record. Mr. Sorensen has made a record. There is no doubt as to his qualifications and fairness to all racial groups, regardless of their color, creed or previous condition of servitude.

I personally have had reason to contact Mr. Sorensen in many instances in the interest of the common people and every time I have contacted him, I have found him willing to lend his position in the interest of uplifting humanity.

Negroes of the State of Nebraska will make no mistake in casting their ballot for Honorable C. A. Sorensen for Chief Justice for the State of Nebraska.


