

#### WAR DEPARTMENT REFUSES NEGROES IN AIR CORPS. SAYING RACE APPROVES

New York, Dec. 23 -A vigourous protest against what is considered a totally unwarranted assumption on the part of the United States War Department, namely that the majority of the Negro citizens indorse the principle of segregated army units was made this week by Walter White, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

White had written to Secretary of War, Harry H. Woording, asking the opening up of the Army Air Corps to Negro citizens. The War Wisecracks About Secretary replied:
