As for you Miss D. W. you admit that you are guilty on at least "one count." Don't make it another by not taking matters up immediately with your parents and consulting a competent physician. Immediate attention is imperative for ills of this type or they will cause you more misery than just embarrassment. Your physician will explain this more fully.
