"Motion pictures are an integral part of the recreation program of the United States Navy. The showing of movies is a nighty diversion on shore stations and ships. The Navy is perhaps the world's largest distributor of motion pictures. It maintains 2000 films in circulation and has a nightly attendance of about 100.000 men. 300 to 400 new films are acquired each year. Two schools are maintained where care and operation of projectors and apparatus is taught Naval

The first large floating drydock of the Navy was the "DEWEY" now at Olongapoo, P. I. This dock was towed there from Chesapeake, Bay, a distance of 13,000 miles. The passage took 150 days.

The first armed forces of the United States to land in France at the start of the World War were Naval aviators, 7 June 1917 at Bordeaux, and 8 June 1917 at St. Nazaire.
