1 package lemon-flavored gelatin; 1 pint hot water; 1 tablespoon vinegar; ¼ teaspoon salt; dash of cayenne; 1 pimiento, cut in strips; 2 hard-cooked eggs, coarsely cut; 1 cup chopped celery; ½ cup chopped olives; 1½ teaspoons chopped chives, or 1 teaspoon

scraped onion.

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and cayenne. Chill until slightly thickened. Arrange pimiento strips in individual molds. Season eggs and celery with 1/8 teaspoon salt; add remaining ingredients. Fold into slightly thickened gelatin. Turn into individual molds and chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 6.
